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Canton woman found dead following crash

Canton Police are investigating the death of a 40-year-old Canton woman, who was involved in a car accident sometime early Thursday morning.

The victim was identified as Diane Wenz. Police said Wenz was found inside a white Dodge Spirit, in an excavation pit on Haggerty Road, north of Michigan Avenue. Construction workers called police shortly after making the discovery at 6:50 a.m.

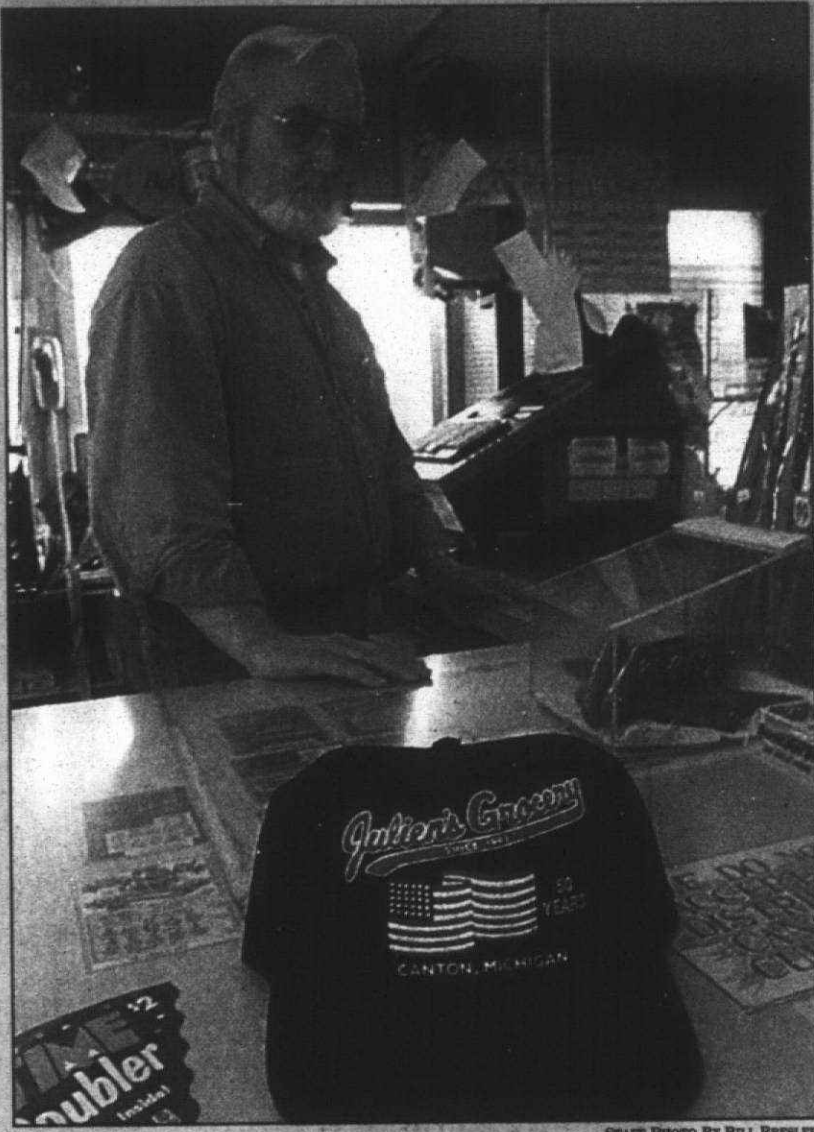
Earlier the same day — about 1:45 a.m. — police were called to the Speedway Gas station located at Michigan and Lotz regarding a 1994 S.T. Chevy Pickup truck that was left in the parking lot. Officers found fresh damage to the pickup.

A phone call was made to the registered owner of the vehicle. The Wayne woman told police she thought she was involved in a car accident at Michigan and Haggerty and that the other driver had fled the scene, according to a police issued press release.

Officers checked the immediate area of the apparent accident, but found nothing out of the ordinary. The abandoned vehicle was impounded for further investigation.

The case is under investigation by Canton's accident reconstruction team. Results of an autopsy performed by the Wayne County Medical Examiner's office were pending.

Minding the store: Bob Julien held back on selling his family's business at Ford and Canton Center until he got an offer he just couldn't pass up. Coffee, doughnuts and "a lot of BS" have crossed Julien's counter since his father, Jim, bought the grocery in 1943, Bob says.

The store — originally a gas station and doughnut shop — at one time had a counter area with stools for residents to gather at lunchtime. In those days it was mostly farmers who stopped by.

Coffee, doughnuts and sandwiches were served up along with "a lot of BS," said owner Bob Julien, 53.

The store has the same feel today as the sound of customers' boots (and Nikes) can be heard

Deal paves way for Hanford

Hanford Road will finally be completed following complex negotiations between township and school officials, local property owners and a developer. Construction could begin by May.

The roadway is separated by five land owners who finally reached an agreement that will give Canton Township property right-of-way for building the two-lane road connector. The project has been several years in the making.

Ask Judith Guest what it takes to get a novel published. She'll likely tell that you despite her success, she knows the exasperation and rejection that accompanies the effort.

"I think a lot of good books can fall through the cracks," she said during

a recent visit to Ann Arbor.

Best known for her novel of family life, "Ordinary People" — made into an award-winning film in the early 1980s — Guest is busy promoting her latest novel, "Errands," which is set in Michigan.

You'll hear more about her latest work when she visits as a guest speaker for the annual Observer-HomeTown Newspapers and Friends of the Libraries Book and Author Luncheon — Thursday, April 17.

The noon event — tickets are \$18 — is at Fox Hills Country Club, 8768

North Territorial Road, Plymouth. It is hosted by the Friends of Plymouth, Canton, Northville and Novi libraries.

Guest is no stranger to Michigan. Her ties run deep. Her brother lives in Farmington Hills, she is a University of Michigan graduate and her parents live in Fenton. Guest lives in Minnesota and also lists Harrisville in Michigan as an address.

Of course one of the first questions Guest gets is if she is related to

HIV-positive man, partner Couple finds life a daily struggle

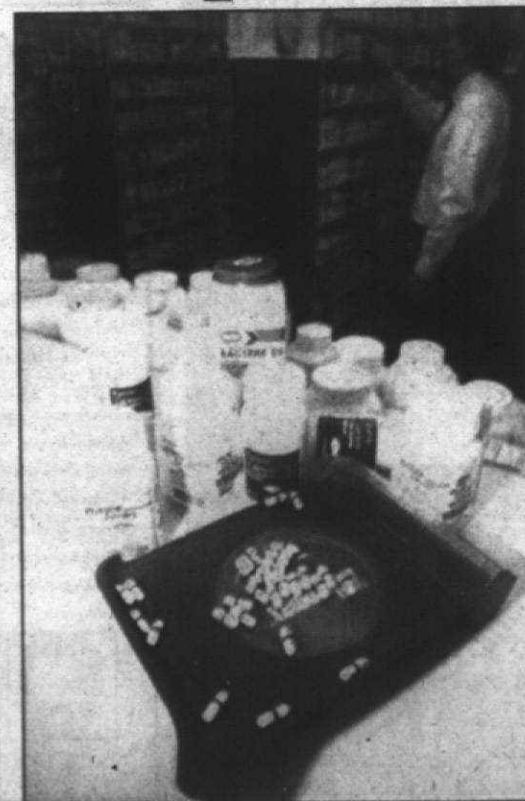

Stan and Gene made a commitment to spend their lives together after they met and fell in love in late 1992.

"We wanted to grow old together," Gene, 48, said. "We always had a 10-year plan for our future."

The Livonia gay couple's commitment hasn't changed, but their long-range dreams have become a lesser priority than keeping Stan, 42, alive for as long as possible.

"What was important yesterday is not important today," Gene said.

Stan learned in October that he had tested positive for HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. He also is infected by cytomegalovirus (CMV), a latent virus that could emerge to leave him blind.

"I know that my life is now going to be limited," said Stan, who didn't want his real name

used. "Sometimes I can sleep up to 18 hours a day. I'm exhausted by the most minimal tasks."

Sitting on kitchen bar stools in their meticulously furnished brick home, Stan and Gene talked nearly three hours about the way HIV has changed their lives. They occasionally paused to give attention to Diane and Miss Thing — small, playful Maltese dogs that scampered around the room.

"These are our babies," Stan said, smiling like a proud parent.

Away from work

Stan has been on leave since Dec. 6 from his social work job with Wayne County Family Independence Agency, Child and Family Services. He has two master's

degrees and a specialist degree. Gene, who has tested negative for HIV, is a General Motors Corp. Powertrain employee who works the afternoon shift.

Stan began noticing a change in his health last spring. He became feverish. He broke into frequent sweats. He had an ear and sinus infection that he couldn't shake. And he felt tired all the time.

"It became harder to function. I would have to come home early from work just to rest," Stan said.

Following some medical tests, he received an

Bus driver ticketed after sliding off road

A Plymouth-Canton substitute bus driver was cited for driving too fast for road conditions after the small bus she was driving slid on ice and struck a van shortly before 8 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 12.

No one was injured in the accident.

"The school bus was traveling south on Sheldon at Ann Arbor Road when the driver hit an icy patch," said LuAnn Grech, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools transportation director.

The bus, transporting four special education students to Burger School in Garden City, slid through a stop light, struck a tree and then careened into oncoming traffic, striking a van.

"There is a full investigation into the incident," said Grech.

Grech couldn't say whether the bus, which has a broken axle, was a total loss. "The bus is on our lot. We are currently conducting internal and external reviews of the damage to the vehicle."

It was the district's fifth bus accident so far this school year.

The students — one adult and three pre-teens, were taken in another bus to Burger.

Grech said she was "pleased that the driver immediately radioed dispatch, and then assisted the bus monitor in attending to the students. The students were evacuated and sustained no injuries. We were pleased with the report that students were in good spirits."

Grech said Plymouth Township police and fire personnel arrived on the scene swiftly.

Plymouth Township Lt. Robert Smith said the bus driver, a 31-year-old Detroit woman, attempted to stop "when the bus slid over the curb before swerving into northbound lane and running off the roadway on the east side of Sheldon."

Police are unsure how fast the driver was traveling. Driving too fast for road conditions carries a \$100 fine and two-point penalty.

Road conditions were hazardous that morning. "It was slippery. We had five or six accidents; more than usual," said Smith.

While the major developments caused the most controversy last year, Canton's planning staff is predicting a slew of small neighborhood commercial projects to draw the most scrutiny in 1997.

Several gas stations are planning to locate on busy Canton intersections, such as Haggerty and Michigan, Canton Center and Michigan, and possibly a Mobil on the site currently occupied by H.W. Motor Homes at Canton Center and Cherry Hill.

Proprietors for Rite Aid also are negotiating a deal to locate where Julien's party store now stands at the corner of Canton Center and Ford, said Community Planner Jeff Goulet.

A small strip mall is planned at Hanford and Canton Center and another application has been submitted to rezone property at Morton Taylor and Ford Road from its current office designation. A market and several restaurants are planned, said Goulet.

Late last year, residents in the Morton Taylor area lobbied successfully against a rezoning that would have allowed a Cooker's restaurant to build on the site.

Cooker's plans to buy the vacant Olive Garden restaurant on Ford Road, he said.

Another restaurant, Chili's, is expected to locate on the property in front of Kmart, next to Hunan Empire, said Goulet.

Mega plans in the works include an entertainment center, complete with restaurants and 20-theater complex, on Ford Road, east of I-275.

Supervisor Tom Yack said he didn't know when the conceptual plan by developer Burton Katzman would become reality since Katzman is in negotiations with at least seven (and possibly as many as 15) property owners to secure the large site. Yack predicted some time would pass before an application is submitted to the township.

A wetland study would be required because the property is

in the path of the Smith drain and Willow Creek floodplain. Besides state Department of Natural Resource and Wayne County Drain Commission approval, the project would need cooperation from the Michigan Department of Transportation, the Wayne County Road Department and, of course, Canton Township.

Last year, Canton approved the development of 1.7 million

square feet of commercial and industrial development — the largest amount since 1993.

Expected to break ground this year include: American Yazaki's 410,000-square-foot headquarters on Haggerty, across from its current facility; Haggerty II Corporate Park East and West, a research park of numerous free-standing buildings; Greenfield Die and Manufacturing and Centre Village Shopping Center at

Canton Center and Ford, which includes a Kroger grocery store.

"We're expecting over 500,000 square feet of commercial and industrial again this year," Goulet said. "We'll see activity along Michigan Avenue and the industrial corridor."

Yack foresees one or two more development plans to come to fruition on Ford Road this year. He also predicts a large user would be found by property managers Ramco-Gershenson, Inc. to occupy the Kmart building when the new Super Kmart opens in May or June. Likely, the building will be divided up into two or three storefronts, Yack said.

"In the next three or four years I think we'll see tear downs (on Ford Road) of old uses to make room for new uses," he said.

creaking over the wooden plank floor. The only concessions to the 1990s are the rack of gourmet coffee and clicking of the lottery machine on a Wednesday or Saturday afternoon.

Julien was 2 years old when his father, Jim, bought the store in 1943 for \$8,500. The Juliens lived above the store for about six months and then settled on a farm in Romulus. Jim Julien added a line of groceries in the late 1940s.

Over the years, it has changed location, appearance and services. However, many of the faces still remain the same as they step in to pick up bread, milk, and lottery tickets. A good majority of the customers stick around with bags in hand to exchange small talk with the owner.

In the 1930s, the gas station/doughnut shop sat in the middle of what is now Ford Road. It was moved when the road was widened to make room for the slow but steady stream of Model As, Julien said. Traffic flow increased and Ford Road was widened again, nearly

putting the store back into the middle of the busy intersection.

"It was the spot to be in the late '60s or early '70s, especially for guys who were car-oriented. It was the obvious place for a lot of the guys to congregate," said Fire Chief Mike Rorabacher, who pumped gas for Julien as a teenager.

"Bob was one of the primary employers of young boys working their way through high school or college," he added. "Looking back, Bob really put up with a lot. He's a very tolerant man, considering he could have put us out to pasture a few times."

The gas pumps were removed about 11 years ago, said Julien, who works nine to 12 hours per day at the party store.

Julien has had several offers

to sell, but declined. Timing and a "jaws-would-drop" offer to buy the property from the Rite Aid Drug Store chain changed his mind, he said. Julien wouldn't comment on the price since closing papers have yet to be signed.

"Most (developers) wouldn't tell you what they wanted to put in. There was an auto supply place and two different drug stores," said Julien.

As for after his retirement, Julien said his "wife has enough to keep him busy for awhile... or maybe I'll see if one of those farmers has a tractor for me to drive."

Julien and his wife, Bonnie, live in Westland. They have six adult children.

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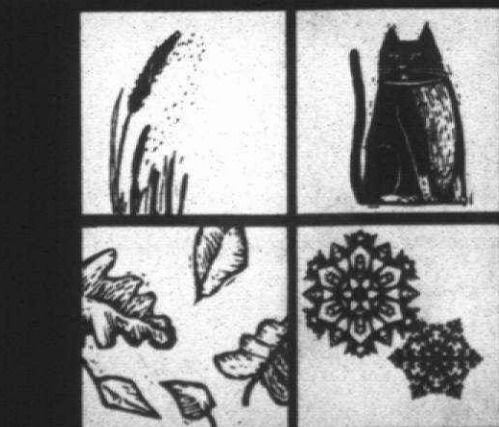
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Passing grades

Canton restaurants meet health department guidelines

Diners can be assured that restaurants in Canton have met all standards by Wayne County Health Department. Although some of the 16 restaurants scored low on the inspection, all passed minimum requirements.

State law requires a restaurant inspection every six months, said Kim Beannum, special services manager for Wayne County Health Department.

Passing is a score of 70 or above on a 100 point scale, she said.

"We return until all critical violations are corrected. Those are ones that involve food protection or food safety," said Beannum.

One of the most typical violations includes the dishwasher not producing enough heat or proper amount of sanitizer being dispersed. The violation is a critical infraction in which inspectors return within a few days to ensure the repair has been made. Restaurants are ordered to wash dishes by hand until the dishwasher is fixed, she said.

Another common violation considered critical is the temperature of food, which must be either under 45 degrees or over 140 degrees.

Other violations, such as plumbing, aren't critical to the safety of food so restaurants are given up to 30 days to comply, she said.

Some Canton restaurants scoring in the 70s include:

Roman Forum, 70. An inspector gave the restaurant a score of 70 on Oct. 2 and noted that raw meat must be kept separate from other foods and on bottom shelf of refrigerator. "Do not store vegetables and raw meat on same tray with raw or cooked meat with raw meat," the review stated. Roman Forum also was requested to put soap and towel at the bar sink. On Dec. 12 an inspector returned and noted that all items were

corrected.

Applebee's, 76. On May 9 an inspector reported that the temperature of ranch dressing was 62 degrees and Caesar dressing was 52 degrees. It should be less than 45 degrees, according to health department standards. On Oct. 21 all items were corrected. A health inspector returned on Dec. 15 after an individual who ate hot wings, chicken tenders and ranch reported a food borne illness. The report said all food products were from approved sources and proper temperatures except for ranch dressing, which had a temperature of 56 degrees.

Chuck E. Cheese, 76. On Nov. 12 an inspector deducted points for the dishwasher not dispensing sanitizer at the time of the visit. It was also noted that chemicals must be stored on different shelving than food and carry-out products. When the inspector returned Dec. 6 all violations were corrected.

First Place Bar and Grill, 76. An inspector reported that the dishwasher was not dispensing sanitizer on Sept. 18. The report also stated that raw meat must be separated from other foods, such as potatoes. It also said the restaurant must provide and ensure employees use the break area for smoking, eating and drinking. On Oct. 3 all violations were corrected.

Thai Bistro, 78. On Oct. 3 an inspector measured raw meat at a temperature of 65 degrees. The restaurant was told to maintain food below 45 degrees. Management also was told to remove a vector control system from above food prep area. On Dec. 6 all items were corrected. A food borne illness also was reported on June 6 by an individual who reported becoming sick 46 hours after eating shrimp, calamari and scallops. An inspector said when investigating the complaint the restaurant was clean and sanitized and food was kept

at the proper temperature.

Other Canton restaurants scored as follows:

Misty Duck, 90. Points were taken off Aug. 27 for the dishwasher not dispersing enough sanitizer. On Aug. 30 the restaurant was approved.

Johnson's, 80. On Dec. 9 an inspector cited that the temperature of ranch dressing was 51 degrees, slightly higher than the required 45 degrees. The restaurant also was required to install a barrier between the handwashing sink and food preparation area. The inspector returned Jan. 19 and all items were corrected.

On Jan. 22 two individuals

reported being ill after eating roast turkey dinners with ranch dressing. An inspector returned to the restaurant and found that it was clean and sanitary. The ranch dressing was recorded at temperature of 54 degrees, above the required 45 degree.

House of Woo, now Nans Garden. An inspector approved the restaurant for opening in October. No score.

Himalaya, 85. On Jan. 3 the restaurant was cited for several minor health codes, including requirements to label foods, store ice scooper with the handle out, provide soap and paper towel at handwashing sink, and empty mop water.

Mr. Coney, 89. An inspector

cited the restaurant for keeping meat products separate from other food. The inspector returned Dec. 16 and Jan. 13 and discovered that the food establishment no longer exists.

Damon's, 86. On Sept. 11 an inspector cited the restaurant for maintaining food above the required 45 degrees. Ham was measured at 51 degrees and cheese at 52 degrees.

Rusty Nail, 89. On Sept. 16 the inspector cited the food establishment for insect control after a number of flies were observed. On Oct. 7 all violations corrected.

Rose's, 87. On Oct. 17 an inspector cited minor plumbing

violations and required that an outer door be sealed for insect control. On Nov. 14 all items were corrected.

Mexican Fiesta, 86. On Sept. 13 the restaurant was cited for the dishwasher not dispensing enough heat on the final rinse. It must reach a temperature of 180 degrees. On Sept. 18 the inspector returned and cited the restaurant for dishwasher not dispensing the proper amount of sanitizer. On Oct. 17 all items corrected.

Sze-Chuan, 88. On Aug. 1, 1996 the restaurant was cited for having dented cans in dry storage. On Sept. 13 all items corrected.

Residents win temporary reprieve on warehouse

Residents of the Canton Hills subdivision at Haggerty, north of Michigan Avenue, have blocked plans for warehouse and distribution facilities next to their homes — at least for now.

About 20 residents showed up at Tuesday's township board meeting to protest a planning commission recommendation that would allow both uses in a proposed \$75 million research park. Buildings would be limited to 45,000 square feet on the west side of Haggerty Corporate Park II if used for warehouse and distribution.

"If a semi truck pulled up to a 45,000-square-foot building at 3 a.m., I'm going to be just as awake as I would be if it was a 90,000-square-foot building," said resident Stephanie Walker.

Officials exempted the westerly one-third of the research park from the special land use designation. Developer Stanley Frankel, who is designing build-to-suit facilities, said he will make another request to the planning commission after reviewing his site plans.

Haggerty Corporate Park II extends to the east and west of Haggerty Road. Preliminary plans show three larger facilities up to 250,000 square feet on the east side and 13 smaller buildings from 35,000 to 65,000 square feet on the west side. Canton Hills and Woodcreek subdivisions about the westerly portion of the west side development.

Several officials said they were reluctant to approve the special land use with an agreement with Frankel to further "study" the westerly portion of the research

park for warehousing.

One suggestion was to face the proposed warehouse facilities toward the residents so that they wouldn't have to look at the rear of the buildings or watch trucks load and unload.

However, site plan approval for industrial projects is completed at the planning staff level. It would not return to the planning commission or township board for final approval if the special land use was granted.

Residents also want additional berms and wooded areas to remain between them and the proposed research park.

"We know what's going to go in there. We don't want to run Mr. Frankel out of town. We just don't want warehousing next to our homes," said Sharon Wasik, president of Canton Hills Homeowners Association.

Yack irked by Mutual Aid snub

It ticks off some neighbors that Plymouth Township is the only community that has not signed the Western Wayne Police Mutual Aid pact.

The picketing by 2,100 UAW members earlier this month outside the local Johnson Controls plant drew attention to the township government's lack of a written commitment to the joint police effort.

Township Police Chief Carl Berry pointed out that the township police attend mutual aid training sessions and respond to all out-county calls for service — exactly as members who've signed the pact.

But that lack of a formal commitment irks some area government leaders.

While several western Wayne County police departments sent officers to help with the Johnson strike, the city of Northville refused — because Plymouth Township has not signed the mutual aid pact.

Canton Supervisor Tom Yack said Canton Public Safety offi-

cers responded to the call "because the people on duty at the time believed they (Plymouth Township) were a member of mutual aid."

Dearborn Police Inspector John Sligay, director of operations for mutual aid, said, "Every time there's been a call out to Plymouth Township, they've responded."

So why doesn't Plymouth Township formally belong? "At the time it began the supervisor (Maurice Breen) didn't feel Plymouth Township should join, I'm not sure what his reasons were," she said.

"We have a history of responding when there are call outs. We have sent members to train with other communities, we have abided with all agreements — that's really the crux of mutual aid," McCarthy said.

Of Canton's Yack, McCarthy said, "I am not sure I understand what his concerns are, I would be more than happy to talk with him."

The Johnson Controls strike and the subsequent call for police mutual aid in Plymouth

Township sparked a complaint call from one member community to mutual aid Chairman Ronald Deziel, Dearborn police chief.

He in turn called Berry. "Their township board has not passed a resolution formally agreeing to the terms of western Wayne mutual aid," Deziel said.

"From a practical standpoint it's not a problem," Deziel said. Yet, a formal agreement to participate guarantees that participation. "It's not really binding but it helps those in administrative positions to plan for those type of situations," he said.

"I have suggested to Chief Berry that perhaps the matter needs to be addressed by his township board," Deziel said.

"Practically speaking it hasn't made a difference. But I think it would be the proper thing for their township board to pass a resolution and be a signator of the pact," he said.

There is no cost to agreeing to participate, other than sending officers to other communities when needed, he said.

school if its \$79.7 million bond issue passes in March.

Road construction is expected to begin as early as May, said township Engineer Tom Casari. Once completed, the township will request a traffic light at the Hanford and Canton Center intersection.

"It will be a nice connection for a half-mile road especially if we get lights at Lilley and Sheldon. It will stretch all the way from Haggerty to Beck ... It's really a collector road to the subdivisions and not meant to carry lots of traffic, but it will help out quite a bit," he added.

In order for residents in Carriage Hills subdivision to get to Canton Center Road, they must take Hanford east to Sheldon Road and then west on Ford Road. Another round-about way

is weaving through neighboring Fox Meadows subdivision.

"It would really help me out to get my daughter to and from dance (at Masters of Dance Arts Inc. on Canton Center)," said resident Jill Kendall of Carriage Hills.

Township Supervisor Tom Yack said the negotiations were complicated, but each property owner benefited in the end. The township gets its long-awaited road at only one-third of the cost, he said.

The school district benefits by having a Hanford Road entrance to the possible building site. An agreement also was made for the township to waive one year of storm water special assessment fees for the school district, which amounts to approximately \$14,000.

Pursuant to an environmental review mandated by 43 FR 6030 (February 10, 1978), implementing E.O. 11988, the Charter Township of Canton has determined that the Harrison Drain, located south of US-12 and adjacent to the railroad tracks beginning at Haggerty Road and extending east of Lot 2 (a total of approximately 4,600 feet), should be cleaned of debris in an area limited to the drain bed and adjacent bank, notwithstanding an area of wetland immediately west of 1275 and adjacent the drain.

The determination was made with due consideration of the following: (1) The project must be located in the drainage course and seventy-nine bank areas that is the only practicable location to clean the drain in the project area to prevent the flooding of adjacent properties. The work will not be in a floodplain or wetland. (2) In determining to do the drain cleaning, the Engineer considered the impact on adjacent properties and cleaning the drain. Project alternatives were considered including that of no action. It was determined that without drain cleaning the adjacent properties would continue to experience flooding and such flooding would continue to worsen over time due to increasing blockage due to the growth of vegetation in the drain. Changing the slopes of adjacent properties or redirecting runoff to another drain are financially impracticable and would result in greater environmental impacts than removing the vegetation in the subject drain segment. (3) The drain cleaning will be coordinated with the Michigan Dept. of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Wayne County Office of Public Services (owner of the drain). (4) The NFIP (National Flood Insurance Program) criteria are demonstrably inappropriate for the proposed action because the work will not take place in a floodplain.

The second, legally noticed public hearing for this project was held February 6, 1997. Project plans are now available for public inspection in the Resource Development Division during regular business hours. The public comment period will run February 17 to March 21, 1997. famed poet Edgar "Bud" Guest. Indeed she is through marriage. It's clear that she feels some connection to the poet, especially

in his descriptions of real and ordinary people.

"He wrote about ordinary people, too," Guest said. After she

had written "Ordinary People," she found a poem Edgar Guest had written titled "Real People." Within the poem was the phrase, "ordinary people."

Her newest novel is also about regular, ordinary people and the obstacles they survive. "Errands" is about a family whose father and husband, Keith, is dying of cancer. The husband accepts his fate, but his wife, Annie, doesn't. They spend their last summer together in a cabin in Au Gres, near Huron Lake, north of Bay City.

The husband's death turns the family's lives upside down. But it takes a second threatening event to change Annie and her three children to understand that even without Keith they are still a family.

Guest said titles are easy for her to write. When she decided on

"Errands" for the new book, she was committed. But editors didn't really like it. They suggested instead, "The Secrets He Kept" and "The Secrets They Kept."

But Guest stuck to her guns. "I love this title. It means a lot to me."

The title is truly about the errands that people do in life. "I have a lot of feelings about the errands women do," she said, adding that errands are the "gifts you give to yourself and other people."

Guest makes it clear that even with such a popular novel as "Ordinary People" on her resume, publication of future novels has been no guarantee.

In fact, "Errands" was initially turned down. Finally, her son Larry, read the book. His verdict: "Fix it." So she cut out 100 pages and rewrote some of it.

Guest sent the book to five publishers, two said yes and they entered a bidding war.

"This is a very precarious and uncertain business," she said. "This is a business contract you're negotiating."

Guest, of course, has an agent. But in the early days when she sent "Ordinary People" to publishers, she had no connections and it was a tough experience getting it published. "I didn't have any trouble getting an agent after I got the book published," she added.

Guest admitted she is not a prolific writer. "I'm just the poky little puppy." She describes herself as a proud grandmother who "mainly writes and babysits."

Reducing Your Risk of AIDS

■ HIV, the virus which causes AIDS, is in the blood, semen or vaginal secretions of an infected person. The two main ways of spreading HIV are having sex and using contaminated needles to inject drugs. In addition, infected women can pass HIV infection to their newborns.

■ "Unprotected sex" is sex without a latex condom. HIV can be in semen (including the first drops of fluid, even before ejaculation) and in vaginal fluids.

■ Any form of unprotected sex is risky, including oral sex. Although condoms are not perfect, they are highly effective in preventing sexually transmitted diseases when used consistently and correctly. Condom failure is usually due to a person not using the condom correctly, rather than flaws in the condom itself.

■ Some sexually transmitted diseases produce open sores or blisters on the genitals. The sores or blisters make it easier for HIV to be transmitted during sex.

■ Sex with multiple partners increases your risk of getting HIV. Contraceptives other than latex condoms do not protect against HIV.

AIDS epidemic strikes Michigan, Wayne County

Current estimates for HIV infection for Michigan are at 8,500 to 11,500 out of a population of approximately 9.3 million. About 3,500 of those infected have AIDS.

"The rest are infected but healthier," said James Kent, HIV epidemiologist for the Michigan Department of Community Health.

Wayne County, with a population of a little over 2 million, has 4,700 to 6,500 people infected with HIV, accounting for 55 to 57 percent of the epidemic in Michigan. Of those, over 1,800 have AIDS.

An estimated 680 to 1,335 people who live in Wayne County outside of Detroit are infected with HIV, including those with AIDS, according to the department.

The state started to keep statistics on AIDS in 1981, said Kent, who has a master's degree in epidemiology from the University of Michigan. Ten years ago, there were a lot of infected people who were relatively healthy.

"The population in Michigan is becoming sicker. There are different reasons for that," he said. "One is the natural course of the epidemic."

There are also a variety of treatments that have helped infected individuals. Public health measures have had an impact on behavior. The answer is obviously yes. It obviously has

had an impact. That impact is, however, difficult to measure.

The figures haven't changed significantly since 1990, Kent said. The state didn't begin to keep statistics on HIV separate from AIDS until 1989.

"We were only counting people who were really ill. Typically, they were hospitalized."

Michigan ranks about ninth in the U.S. in population, but is 33rd when AIDS cases are calculated by dividing the number of cases by the population. Michigan is 17th in the total number of AIDS cases reported.

The mortality rate has gone up, although it appears to have leveled off around 1995, Kent said. The number of persons diagnosed each year has also become level since about 1993. Mortality rates continue to climb for some people, such as young black men.

Quilt tells local man's life story

Theresa Vincent's son, John, died on July 25, 1996, but his memory lives on.

John Vincent, who was 34 when he died of complications from AIDS, will be among those featured in the Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt.

"He was aware of his illness

for 10 years," Theresa Vincent of Redford Township said of her third youngest child, one of nine born to Theresa and her late husband, Walter John Vincent, who earned a degree from Michigan State University, taught AIDS awareness and prevention in schools.

The family had heard about the quilt project and thought it

was a great idea. John Vincent's partner, Jon Chapman, has worked with the family on the project.

John Vincent was active in his life, AAEP, which worked on AIDS education and prevention. "That's still in existence," his mother said. "A lot of people made contributions to that" when John died.

She and other family members are arranging a Mass for the spring at Our Lady of Loretto Catholic Church in Redford. The quilt panel, which measures 12-by-12 feet, will be displayed. The family had a healing Mass at the church with the Rev. Rich Bartoszek, who is active in AIDS ministry, on April 2, 1995, and John was able to attend.

A spring display is planned at the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus, she said.

The John Vincent panel features pictures of him. It includes a portion for those who cared for him at the Henry Ford Health System. There's a friends' part and portions for other family members.

"Doing it with the friends and all" was rewarding, she said. Theresa Vincent and her brother worked on one section of the panel, including several tributes to John.

She never had trouble accepting her son's homosexuality.

Her husband died young, which meant she had to go to work. The children looked after each other.

Her son's diagnosis was a shock at first as there was less known about HIV. "Everyone accepted it. We were with him all the way." Family members appreciate the excellent medical care he received.

At the hospital, Theresa Vincent saw some other patients who didn't have loving families. "Fortunately, he wasn't from one of those families."

The 13 nieces and nephews, when younger, called him "Uncle Chops," on account of a slight weight problem, and his partner "Uncle Jon." The children didn't understand the nature of the relationship, she said, but were accepting.

"Nothing that ever separated us, I'll tell you that."

Oct. 1 phone call telling him to contact his doctor immediately.

"HIV was one of the last things that I really thought about," Stan said. "But I had never had a phone call like that. I was very upset."

The next day, Gene accompanied Stan for a doctor's office visit that brought the devastating news.

"I just became totally drained," Stan recalled. "It was as if I lost total feeling. It was like a dream state. I broke down. I could only think the very worst."

Gene has had an HIV test every month since then, and his results have consistently been negative. Stan said he can't figure out how he became infected.

"We have been monogamous. I have not cheated," he said, adding that an HIV test in December 1995 was negative. "It must have been from blood, but I don't know how."

Stan, who isn't visibly sick, has told select friends and family members about his condition, including his only sister. He hasn't told his only brother, who lives out of state, or his 75-year-old mother, who is still coping with the cancer death of Stan's father two years ago.

"We decided it would be too much for my mother right now," Stan said. "But she knows that something is wrong, because I have been off work."

Niece Julie — to whom Stan is godfather — has been particularly supportive of him. Stan once wanted to adopt his own child, and Julie "has been like the child I never had."

Although he spends more time at home now, Stan suffers from chronic fatigue syndrome that leaves him too tired to enjoy his hobbies.

"My passion is working outside in the yard," he said. "I love gardening and planting flowers. The greatest sensation is to get my

hands in dirt, but I couldn't do much last summer."

Handling chores

Most household chores have been passed to Gene, who juggles those responsibilities along with holding down his job and helping Stan.

Stan frequently sleeps until early afternoon, only to awake to nausea. He takes as many as 16 pills a day for health problems, including Retrovir and Epiriv for HIV.

Doctors suspect he has liver damage. He also has suffered ulcerative colitis that, at times, left him unable to control his bowel movements. When he was working, he had to go home sometimes just to change clothes.

"That is humiliating for a 42-year-old man," he said. Two workplace employees, including his immediate supervisor, know about his HIV status.

In December, Stan battled influenza. "It wiped me out." HIV patients have to be keenly aware of their T-cells, a measure of the immune system's strength. Stan should have 1,500 to 1,800 of them. His last count was 523; it has been as low as 435.

He said he will have AIDS if his T-cell count dips below 200. He also runs the risk of CMV-related blindness with a low T-cell count.

"That's one of my biggest concerns" along with pneumonia, which kills many AIDS patients, Stan said.

He wants to join a support group to share HIV experiences and to learn about drugs that other patients are taking.

You grasp at straws because you're dealing with your life," he said.

Gene wants to accompany him, but they haven't found any weekend meetings. Weekdays

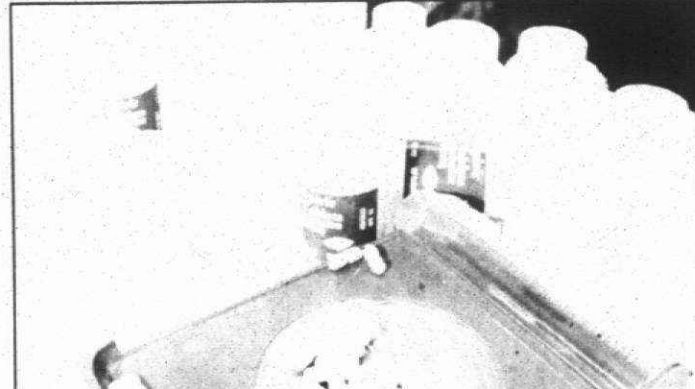

aren't good because of Stan's morning nausea and Gene's afternoon job.

Stan receives support from neighbors whom he has told about his disease. They heaped baked goods on him last Christmas.

He also draws support from employees of The Stables, a Livonia bar and grill that he and Gene frequent. The owner specially orders Perrier water for Stan, who is supposed to limit alcohol consumption.

Even before he was sick, Stan was allowed by The Stables employees to hang a Christmas stocking alongside theirs in honor of Miss Thing, the only dog he had at the time. Customers and employees stuffed it with money that was donated to the Michigan Humane Society in Westland.

Stan conceded, however, that some people once considered friends haven't remained supportive.

"There will be no life support after seven days," Gene said. Gene said he is more optimistic than Stan that a cure will be found.

"I hope that there will be a cure," Stan said, "but I don't think there will be a cure in my lifetime."

Stan worries about Trixie and Miss Thing. His doctor told him that the dogs will need to leave his house if his T-cell count dips below 200, because they might carry bacteria that could threat-

en his health. "That's heart-breaking," Stan said.

If he agrees to let them go, a close friend plans to keep the dogs so he can visit.

"Once I'm dead," he said, "the dogs can come back home" to Gene.

Gene has pledged to stay with Stan, and he gave Stan a ring when they celebrated their fourth commitment anniversary on Dec. 30.

Although they practice safer sex, they have become less intimate.

"My biggest fear in my relationship is that I will give him my disease," Stan said. "I could not live with the guilt of infecting him."

Stan and Gene have wills naming one another as beneficiaries, and they have exclusive rights to make decisions if one should be placed in life support.

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Bill repealing photo ID law for voters goes to Senate

Eleven crossover Republicans helped House Democrats pass a bill that would repeal a 1996 state law requiring voters to show a photo identification before being given a ballot.

"I had considerable feedback since this was passed in the lame-duck session in December," said Rep. Nancy Cassis, R-Now, who backed the bill then but voted Feb. 13 to repeal it.

"All my clerks have concerns about requiring photo ID," said Cassis.

"Where is there authenticated, recorded abuse that requires photo ID? We Republicans are the party of less government, less regulation, less intrusion into the lives of individuals," she said.

The House voted 66-40 to pass House

Bill 4226 repealing the photo ID law and sent it to the Senate, controlled 22-16 by Republicans.

Unless repealed, the law will take effect April 1. It requires a person to present either a driver's license or other identification with a photo before being issued a ballot.

Voting yes were were Republican Gerald Law of Plymouth and Democrats Bob Brown of Dearborn Heights, Eileen DeHart of Westland and Tom Kelly of Wayne.

Voting no was Lyn Bankes, R-Redford. She cited vote counting problems in Redford's Nov. 5 election in which ballots were sealed in a locked township hall.

Absent was Deborah Whyman, R-Canton — the equivalent of a "no" vote. Republicans failed, mainly on party-

line votes, to soften the effect of the original law. Among the rejected amendments:

- Not require a photo ID if the polling place has a record of the voter's registration with a signature.

- Require the Secretary of State to issue free photo identification cards to persons who don't have driver's licenses. Democrats scoffed that the GOP provided no cost estimate or appropriations bill.

- Never require any individual, company or public official to demand a photo ID under any circumstances.

Rep. Bob Brackenridge, R-St. Joseph, a former county clerk, argued for keeping the photo ID law. He said the federal "motor voter" law prevents local clerks from canceling the registrations of persons who haven't voted.

Result: Each year 10 percent of voters who no longer live in the area swell the voter lists, and 20 percent of Michigan registrations are now dead wood. "The possibility for fraud is out there," said Brackenridge.

Democrats argued that the fraud Republicans seek to prevent is non-existent and a burden on senior citizens who no longer drive.

Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled in an opinion the photo ID law is a burden that violates the U.S. Constitution ("equal protection of the laws").

Kelley cited a 1972 U.S. Supreme Court decision that said, "A heavy burden of justification is on the state" to demonstrate such restrictive laws are "necessary to promote a compelling governmental interest."

Kelley added, "Michigan already pre-

vents voter fraud by less drastic means."

Gov. John Engler, a Republican who signed the original law, said Kelley came to a wrong conclusion, adding, "It is absurd to think that the state is precluded from refining this process until full-blown election fraud has occurred. Nine other states have an ID requirement for voting, and Hawaii has a photo ID requirement."

Engler said he would have his office's attorney go to court to challenge Kelley's opinion. Engler said the attorney general's procedure afforded no opportunity for a pro-photo ID point of view to be considered.

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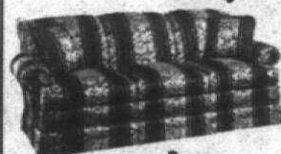
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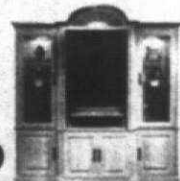

Happy grapes make good wine

Mediterranean is not a term frequently associated with Australian wine. But it should be when it comes to McLaren Vale in South Australia. Climate there is consistently Mediterranean with sea breezes from Spencer Gulf. The region is generally free of frost, hail, draught and vine disease. Result? Very happy grapes. Happy grapes make good wine and that is showcased in the McLaren Vale bottlings from Seaview and Edwards & Chaffey.

Within the McLaren Vale area are "vales" or small valleys, each with a different microclimate. Microclimate diversities enable a winery to match vineyard site to grape variety. Seaview has done that with its plantings of chardonnay, sauvignon blanc, cabernet sauvignon and shiraz.

"In particular, McLaren Vale has garnered an international reputation for chardonnay and shiraz," Seaview winemaker Mike Farmilo said. While McLaren Vale and Seaview wines may be new to you, they are steeped in rich history dating back to 1850 when George Pitches Manning migrated from England and purchased 161 acres of virgin land in the McLaren Vale region. Managing vineyards and making wine passed to Manning's children who sold the business in 1892. After that, it changed ownership several

times until 1950 when it was christened Seaview by new owners California-born W.B. Chaffey and winemaking pioneer F. H. Edwards. In 1951, their winery became one of the first in Australia to release a varietally-labeled cabernet sauvignon.

Winemaker

State-of-the-art winemaking at Seaview is carried on today by winemaker Mike Farmilo. "I prefer to use fruit from the sloping areas of the McLaren Vale area because the flavor is more intense," he said. "In chardonnay this is detected as rich melon and tropical fruit flavors. For cabernet sauvignon the translation is sweet berry enlivened with mint

and cassia. Shiraz comes across with berry, plum, pepper and a unique peppery spiciness." Seaview's premier estate vineyards are saved for the winery's Edwards & Chaffey wines named after the visionary partners who purchased the winery and vineyards in the mid '50s.

"Edwards & Chaffey are our reserve wines," Farmilo added. "They come from our best vineyard blocks with older vines and lower yields. For example, we age the Edwards and Chaffey Shiraz in new French oak because the fruit is so concentrated that it requires the character and complexity that only new French oak provides."

It's a similar regime with the Edwards & Chaffey Cabernet Sauvignon. While Seaview Cabernet Sauvignon is aged 12 months in two- to four-year-old oak because it is not as concentrated and would be over-powered by new oak, Edwards & Chaffey Cabernet Sauvignon is aged 18 months in new French oak.

Tasting

A recent tasting of Seaview and Edwards & Chaffey underscored Farmilo's comments. The 1993 Seaview McLaren Vale Semillon-Sauvignon Blanc blend \$10 was highlighted by melon, hay and fragrant straw scents accented by a touch of oak. Because this wine is nearly four years from vintage, it highlights the unique character and graceful aging that Semillon brings to Australian wines. Fabulously balanced, it is still available in our market.

The 1996 Seaview Chardonnay \$10 is typical McLaren Vale with ripe melon, tropical fruit and a distinct peach character. Very flavorful, it is a big mouthful for the price.

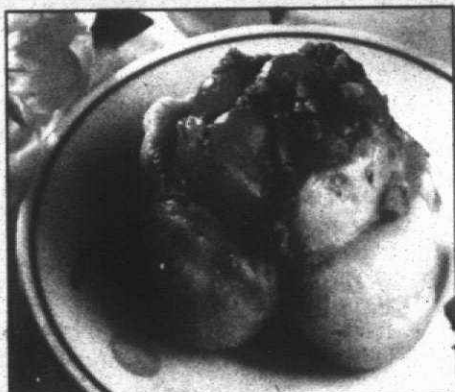

George Washington didn't cut down a cherry tree for the firewood. He did it for the cherries. Americans still love this bright, flavorful fruit, and Michigan, Washington and Oregon lead the nation in cherry production.

There are two kinds of cherries: tart and sweet.

Tart cherries, sometimes called "pie cherries" or sour cherries, are seldom sold fresh. Usually, they are frozen, canned or made into juice soon after harvesting.

Michigan produces 70 to 75 percent of the tart cherries in the United States. Montmorency cherries, harvested from the mineral-rich soils of the northeast corner of Michigan's lower peninsula, have earned the region the title of "Cherry Capital of the World."

Besides sliding them in between two flaky crusts, there are a variety of uses for sour cherries. Chop and mix them with applesauce or yogurt, add them to your favorite bread stuffing or meatloaf, or blend them with ice cream for a cherry shake. You can even stuff them with cream cheese and nuts for a salad garnish.

Dried cherries, processed from tart cherries with or without the addition of sugar, have a passionately intense taste. Add them to rice pudding, pancake batter, muffins and barbecue sauces. Sprinkle them on salads, hot cereals and French toast. Transform your apple and peach pies by adding a half cup of dried cherries to the filling. Eat them and love them.

Sweet cherries

Michigan produces about 20 percent of the nation's group of sweet cherries each year. Sweet cherries most often are sold fresh, especially during the summer, when mounds of the dark, jewel-toned variety brighten roadside stands or supermarket produce displays.

Canned, dark sweet cherries are plentiful on grocers' shelves. Don't reserve them only for baked goods. Use them as the basis for sweet and sour sauces for a variety of meat dishes.

From the lighter, sweeter varieties of cherries — the Queen, Annes and the Golds — we get maraschinos, America's fun-loving party cherry. It's the cherry you don't miss until it's

not there. Try putting parsley in your Manhattan or on top of your ice cream sundae and you'll know what I mean.

"Maraschino" refers to a process, not a variety. The cherries are brined in deep, inground pits for 60 days, pitted then sent to processing plants where they are washed and placed into 5,000-pound vats. As water is extracted or evaporated, a sugar solution is slowly added over a six-week period. Finally, the vibrant red food coloring is added along with oil of almond. It's party time!

Cherries, low in sodium and calories and with no cholesterol, are power-packed with vitamins, especially vitamin A. Compared to apples, cranberries, peaches, grapes and strawberries, cherries have the highest level of calcium, iron, magnesium, phosphorus and copper. They have equivalent amounts of potassium — important to the body's water balance — to peaches and grapes.

Food folklore claims that cherries can relieve the pain of arthritis or gout and even act as an aphrodisiac. That's good news for cherry-lovers who just care about the taste.

Authors share a taste of the White House

I nominate "My Fellow Americans," for "Dinner and a Movie," on President's Day, Monday, Feb. 17, and the Revised & Updated Centennial Edition of "White House Cookbook" for those who'd rather skip the movie and just eat dinner.

"My Fellow Americans" starring Jack Lemmon, James Garner, Dan Aykroyd and Lauren Bacall (playing former First Lady Margaret Kramer) is a comedy about two former U.S. presidents Republican Russell Kramer (Douglas) and Democrat Matt Lemmon (Garner) who can't stand each other, and have nothing in common except that they were both presidents.

When the current president, (Dan Aykroyd) tries to blame a scandal of his own design on Kramer, the two ex-presidents travel cross country together to reveal the truth. They meet, unexpectedly, in Chicago at the American Booksellers Association Convention where Kramer Hawks his seventh book — "Hail to the Chef: A Taste of Power, The

Presidential Recipes of Russell Kramer." While serving as president, Kramer cooked for many of his guests.

Movie fans will be delighted to know such a cookbook exists. Written by Tom Connor and Jim Downey, (Time-Life Books, copyright November 1996, \$12.95), the book is a collection of regional recipes, accompanied by anecdotes from Kramer's time in the White House, and 16 pages of color photos from the movie.

About the "Layered Turkey Enchilada Casserole," Kramer remarks, "I knew a lot of turkeys when I was in Washington. I had to get through 20 layers of them to get a bill passed."

The movie is silly, but the recipes are sure to win your vote for what's for dinner tonight. They're divided into five sections — New England & Mid-Atlantic, the South, Midwest, Southwest, and West Coast — offering a taste of specialty foods from these regions. Most are short on ingredients, and simple to make.

Registered dietitians Patti Bazel Geil and Tami Ross, diabetes nutri-

tion educators at the University of Kentucky Hospital, dish out history and low-fat recipes in the "Revised & Updated Centennial Edition of the White House Cookbook," (Chronimed Publishing, copyright 1996, \$13.95).

"White House Cookbook"

First printed in 1894, the original "White House Cookbook," written by Hugo Ziemann (White House steward under Grover Cleveland) and F.L. Gillette, does not reflect the needs of today's cooks.

"Although proper nourishment was undoubtedly a goal for the authors of the 1894 edition of the book, the call for lard, fat, cream, eggs, or salt in most of the original recipes makes them unsuitable for today," write the authors. "Homemakers of that time spent the better part of their days at home in the kitchen, and there was a strong reliance on all manner of game, from wild hare to partridge."

LAYERED TURKEY ENCHILADA

CASSEROLE
1 can (16 ounces) tomato sauce
1 can (4 ounces) diced green chilies
1 clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon chili powder
2 teaspoons ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon oregano
1/4 teaspoon pepper
9 corn tortillas

1/2 pound cooked turkey, cut into 2-inch by 1/4-inch by 1/4-inch strips
6 to 8 green onions, coarsely chopped
1 package (10 ounces) frozen corn kernels, thawed
2 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese (about 3/4 pound)

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Lightly butter a shallow 1-quart baking dish.

Mix the tomato sauce, chilies, garlic, chili powder, cumin, oregano and pepper together.

Put 3 of the corn tortillas, overlapping them, on the bottom of the baking dish. Spread them with 1/3 of the tomato mixture.

Then, cover the tomato mixture with half of the turkey, green onions and corn. Sprinkle with 1 cup of the cheddar cheese. Top the cheese with 3 more tortillas, half of the remaining tomato mixture, all of the remaining turkey, green

onions and corn and 1 cup of the cheese.
Top the cheese with the remaining 3 tortillas, the remaining tomato mixture and the remaining 1/2 cup cheese. Bake it, uncovered, for 25 minutes and serve the casserole hot. Serves 6.

MACARONI AND CHEDDAR BAKE

1 1/2 cups uncooked small elbow macaroni (about 1/2 pound)
1 cup cottage cheese
1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
2/3 cup sour cream
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cups grated sharp cheddar cheese (8 ounces)
1 package (10 ounces) frozen peas
3 tablespoons minced fresh chives or green onions (optional)

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Butter a 1 1/2 quart baking dish.

Cook the macaroni according to package directions; drain.

Meanwhile, put the cottage cheese and mustard in a food processor and process until it's smooth. Put this mixture into a large bowl and stir in the sour cream and pepper. Then, stir in the cooked macaroni, 1 1/2 cups of the cheddar cheese, the peas and the chives, if desired. Mix it well.

Put this mixture in the baking dish and sprinkle it with the remaining 1/2 cup cheddar cheese. Bake it for 25 minutes or until it's lightly browned. Serves 6.

LOWER-FAT VERSION HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON'S CHIP COOKIES

1 1/2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
2/3 cup reduced-fat stick margarine
1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup vanilla
1 teaspoon butter flavoring
1/2 cup egg substitute
2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats
10 ounces mini chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine flour, salt, and baking soda in one bowl. In a separate bowl, beat together margarine, sugars, vanilla and butter flavoring until creamy. Add egg substitute, beating until light and fluffy.

Gradually beat in flour mixture and rolled oats. Stir in chocolate chips. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. In a separate bowl, cream margarine and powdered sugar until light and fluffy. 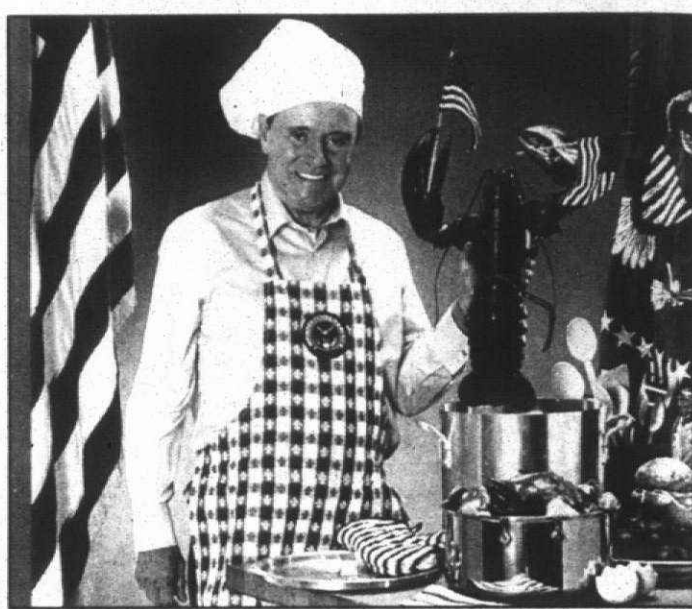

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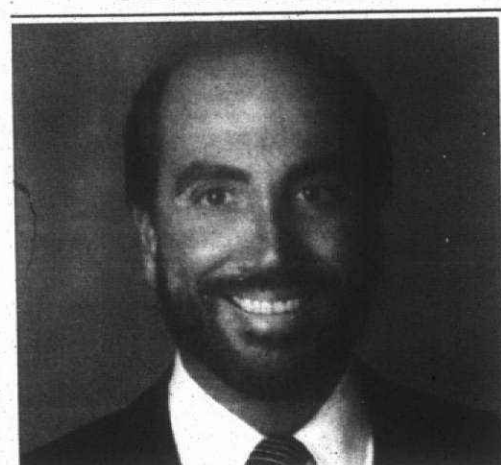

Smoking ages that pretty face

It's official — smoking can make you old and wrinkly. Researchers have found that nicotine causes the skin to grow thinner — 40 percent thinner in fact, and therefore, it is more prone to wrinkling and premature aging.

If no other arguments have convinced you to quit the habit by now, perhaps by appealing to your vanity I may give you pause next time you light up. It is rather unsettling in this day and age, with the studies that have been done, plus the anecdotal evidence, that rational people are still puffing.

Anyway, back to research. Apparently doctors in England have done comparative studies on 50 sets of identical twins, one of which smoked and one who didn't. The imprint of the smoker's faces showed more wrinkles, less pores. Considering the twins had the same set of genes, you would assume they would age at the same rate.

Doctors have always referred to what they call "smoker's face," and say they can recognize a smoker at twenty paces. Generally, there is a more haggard look, sallower features, and many more finer lines around the mouth and eyes.

The why and wherefore

But with the development of an ultrasound technique, the skin can be measured. Doctors believe that smoking releases an enzyme that breaks down the collagen and elastic tissue. Collagen is the framework of the face, to put it in laymen's terms, and if this is damaged, you can imagine the results.

Another theory is that smoking damages genetic material and that the blood supply to the top layer of skin is restricted causing deterioration in the long run. Does it really matter which theory is correct? Unless you are aiming for a Nobel Prize, I think your concerns are a little closer to home.

I called a friend, Dr. John Alter, a leading plastic surgeon with offices in West Bloomfield and Waterford, to find out what it is like on the front lines. He commented:

"I truly think that smoking is worse for the skin than extensive sun exposure. I have noted a more leathery, sallower look in my smoking patients. Of course this is a generalization, for a lot of results depend on the gene pool the patient comes from. Interestingly, it is not as easy to perform plastic surgery on a smoker. The capillaries are more obviously constricted and due to the thinness of the skin, can lead to a condition called rosacea. The procedures tend to be more extensive due to vascular changes."

We have all seen the thin women in the magazines, the social X-rays, the women who smoke to keep thin to look great in clothes. What a sad commentary, and what a bad example to give our children. Everybody has a relative/acquaintance who has smoked every day and lived to be 100. But to use that as an excuse to smoke is about as logical as sky jumping without a parachute. Somebody, somewhere probably survived a fall once.

Save the children

What really amazes me though is the younger generation who are smoking at alarming rates, according to experts. Maybe it's because I just turned 50 that I am having this mid-life crisis, realizing just how far removed I am from the minds of teenagers.

I understand the need to rebel, to separate from the older generation, and to this extent I can even forgive tattoos and body piercing, just as long as I don't have to look at the results on a daily basis. But smoking is stupid, and how can you kiss somebody after they have smoked? No amount of gargling can cover the smell.

In the 1940s it was considered sophisticated to smoke. Most of the film stars advertised cigarettes, or were photographed smoking. In the 50s it was "in" to smoke. By the 60s, though, evidence started to come in, and the smoke began to clear, if you'll pardon the pun.

This is not in the least scientific, but it seems to me that we are getting more images of young people smoking in movies of late, particularly disturbing is the chic-ness surrounding cigars — there's an accessory you can all do without for the coming season.

The smell of freshly popped popcorn and the eager faces of a half dozen store clerks greet customers as they walk inside the Dillman & Upton hardware store in downtown Rochester.

Nestled near a residential area just blocks from the main drag, the 86-year-old lumber and hardware business is still going strong with third generation owners Brad and Todd Upton safely at the helm.

One of the city's oldest business establishments, the 1990's version of Dillman & Upton is dubbed "a full-scale home center that continues to serve both homeowner and builder."

Despite that trendy moniker, the store has never set aside the cozy, small town originality that allows customers to gather in the "morning coffee corner" to chat before they shop. Dillman & Upton's product line has of course expanded over the years and currently includes cabinets, windows, wood flooring and decorating items.

The recent onslaught of warehouse style hardware store chains made the changes essential, said Upton.

"It seems to us that no one is pushing for that business anymore and everyone is just giving up not wanting to compete against the bigger outlet style stores," said Upton.

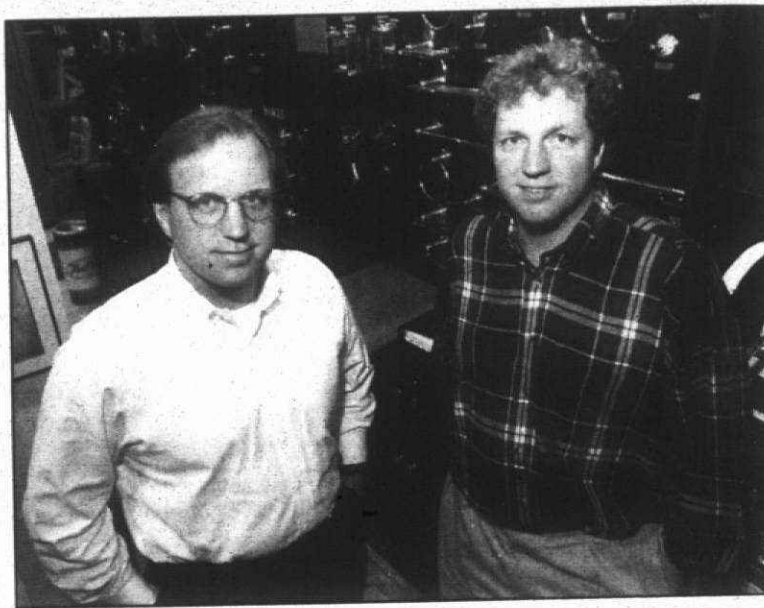
"Well, we love the homeowners' business. We feel it's an opportunity for us because there aren't many independents like us left."

When Dillman & Upton relocated to its current 43,000-square foot location at 607 Woodward St. in 1987, Upton said they may have lost "a drive-by location" on Main St. but their reputation has kept the business strong. The staple that remains a major factor in Dillman & Upton's continued success is service to the customer via the store's well trained 40 person staff.

"What we sell is service. A piece of board is a piece of board, but can a clerk tell you what you can do with that board?" said Upton. "We offer service and have specialists in many areas of the store. We also have full-time employees with benefits. We don't have a lot of part-time people. And we don't have a turn over, I have a few people who have been here 20 years and a few even 30 years."

Steve Morris has been bringing his business to Dillman & Upton for 15 years and says he simply enjoys the "old fashioned, friendly way of doing business" the store offers.

"The service at this store is more than anything I've ever known," said Morris. "No matter what it is that I need they will get it, find it, or have it made, and you just can't find that service anywhere else today."

The benefits of being able to work closely with the customers is something Upton views as a plus for everyone. "I really enjoy it because the people are excited when they come in here and they're planning their new home or doing projects and I enjoy talking about that with them," he said. "And we're small enough that I can still go out to the jobs and estimate projects."

Dillman & Upton's claim to fame in the business today is their expertise on wood decks. The store hosts several seminars each year that offer tips to homeowners planning to construct their own decks.

"It's been a really good thing for us because it kind of binds you with the customer," said Upton, who feels all of the store's changes still lead back to the same great service.

"We are still a good nuts and bolts kind of hardware store," smiled Upton. "We haven't really set any of that aside."

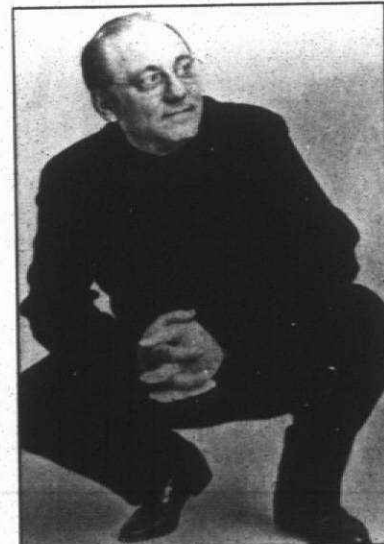
The Steppin' Out Foundation is a non-profit organization that provides financial support to agencies offering direct aid to people with AIDS in southeastern Michigan.

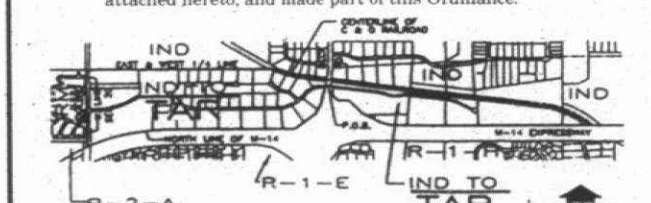

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:
Part I. The Zoning Ordinance No. 83 of the Plymouth Charter Township, is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amended Zoning Map No. 86, attached hereto, and made part of this Ordinance.



LEGAL DESCRIPTION
Part of the South 1/2 of Sections 20 and 21, T.1S., R.8E., Plymouth Township, Wayne County, Michigan more particularly described as: Beginning at a point, being the intersection of the North line of the M-14 Highway right of way and the East line of Section 20; said line also being the West line of Section 21 and the centerline of Beck Road and proceeding thence in a Westerly and Southwesterly direction along said North right of way line to the point of intersection with the centerline of Ridge Road, also being the West line of said Section 20; thence Northwesterly along said West section line and centerline of Ridge Road to a point of intersection with the East and West 1/2 line of said Section 20; thence Easterly along said 1/2 line to the point of intersection with the centerline of the C&O Railroad right of way; thence Southeasterly along said right of way centerline to the point of intersection with the North right of way line of said M-14 Highway; and thence Westerly and Northwesterly along said North right of way to the Point of Beginning.

materials, parts, assemblies, and similar items shall be prohibited.

- Evidence satisfactory to the Planning Commission shall be provided that the storage can not reasonably be enclosed in a building.
- Evidence satisfactory to the Planning Commission that continued enforcement will not cause an undue hardship to the Township.
- All open storage shall be completely screened on all sides by a decorative masonry or brick obscuring wall which matches the main building, or a berm eight (8) feet in height, located a minimum of twenty-five (25) feet from the street setback when the area abuts a street. An eight (8) foot wide planting strip shall be located on the street side of the wall or berm. When the side and/or rear yard does not abut a street, the wall or berm shall be located on the property line. The combined use of a wall and a berm shall be permitted.
- Within the intent of this section, the Planning Commission may approve alternatives as it deems necessary to accommodate peculiar circumstances or unforeseen problems and to carry out the spirit and intent of this Ordinance.

Any other use of the same nature or class as uses listed in this district as either a Principal Use Permitted or a Use Subject to Special Conditions which the Planning Commission finds not to be inconsistent with the purpose of this Article and which will not impair the present or potential use of adjacent properties. When considering other uses, the Planning Commission will review the nature and function of the use and its proposed location to ensure that said use will not present a potential conflict with principal permitted technology and research uses.

SEC. 15.3-A. USES SPECIFICALLY PROHIBITED

No building or land shall be used and no building shall be erected for any one or more of the following uses:

- The following uses or similar uses which may create unusual danger for fire, explosion, toxic or noxious matter, radiation or which may cause noxious, offensive, unwholesome or harmful odors, fumes, dust, smoke, light, waste, noise or vibration shall be considered as not meeting the minimum standards of this Ordinance as to performance and potential negative impacts on surrounding properties:
 - Processing of corrosive acid, cement, lime, gypsum or plaster.
 - Distillation of bone, coal, tar, petroleum refuse, grain or wood.
 - Processing or storage of explosives.
 - Processing of fertilizer or storage of compost.
 - Processing of products from animal refuse or offal including glue, size or gelatin.
 - Processing using steam or board hammers or forging presses.
 - Tanning, curing or storage of raw, green or salted skins or hides.
 - Manufacturing of sulfuric, sulfuric, nitric, picric, carbolic, hydrochloric or other corrosive acid, however the use of corrosive acids in connection with any permitted use is not prohibited.
 - Petroleum or asphalt refining, mixing or manufacturing.
 - Slaughtering of animals, stock yards, livestock feeding yards.
 - Manufacturing or disposal, above or below ground, of nuclear or radioactive materials.
 - Processing of garage, offal, dead animals, refuse, rancid fats.
- Warehousing, truck transfer or distribution centers as a principal use.

SEC. 15.4-A. DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS

In order to obtain site plan approval, all developments in the Technology and Research (TAR) District shall comply with the following requirements:

- Site plan and development approval for all uses as specified in Article 24 of this Ordinance.
- Off-street parking for all uses as specified in Article 20 of this Ordinance, except that technology and research uses shall provide one parking space for every 300 square feet of usable floor area, usable floor area being defined as 80 percent of gross square footage.
- Off-street loading and unloading for all uses as specified in Article 20 of this Ordinance. The Planning Commission may modify such requirements, if in its sole determination, the use does not require the number of loading spaces specified in Article 20.
- Screening and land use buffers for all uses unless otherwise specified shall be in accordance with Article 22 of this Ordinance.
- All doors designed for vehicles, and loading docks and truck wells shall not be located on the front of the building, and shall be screened from view from any road.
- Signs for all uses as specified in Article 21 of this Ordinance, except that pole signs shall not be permitted.
- Height, area, lot coverage and yard regulations as specified in Article 16 Schedule of Regulations of this Ordinance.

The following specified requirements shall apply within the TAR Technology and Research District:

- Machines Permitted: All machines are permitted when installed and operated so as not to allow a noise, odor, fumes, dust, smoke, glare or radioactive material exceeding the limits set for Environmental Performance Standards, Section 23.17. In no case shall such impacts be detectable from districts in which residence occupancy is permitted within the Charter Township of Plymouth.
- Environmental Performance Standards. Compliance with the Environment Performance Standards in Section 23.17 is required for all uses.
- Setback Landscaping: All setback areas shall be landscaped with lawns, trees, shrubs and/or other plantings, and may include reflecting pools, retaining walls and other landscape construction harmonious with the overall landscape scheme. Parking and loading areas may be located in side and rear setback areas, but shall be prohibited from the front yard setback. Parking provided in a side yard setback adjacent to a street shall be provided with a 10 foot landscaped greenbelt, adjacent to that street. On a corner lot, one of the front yards may be designated a side yard. Parking and loading areas shall be screened in compliance with Article 22 of this Ordinance.
- Source of Power: Power for any manufacturing or heating process or activity shall be derived only from electrical energy, smokeless fuels, such as gas or oil, or smokeless solid fuels containing less than twenty (20%) percent of the volatile content on a dry basis.
- Yard Grading and Drainage: All yards in the TAR Technology and Research District shall be graded in a manner which shall avoid the ponding of storm water unless said conditions have been designed to occur as part of a storm detention plan which has been approved by the Charter Township of Plymouth, and such grading shall comply with the engineering design standards for the Charter Township of Plymouth. A detailed grading plan shall be submitted by the builder and shall be approved by the Charter Township of Plymouth prior to issuance of a permit.
- Emergency Access: All buildings shall be readily accessible by fire and emergency vehicles and shall comply with the Township Fire

Newburgh Lake soil headed for landfill

Soil excavated from Newburgh Lake will not be used to cap old contaminated sites in Detroit and a former landfill site at the former Cooper School in Westland.

Jim Murray, director of Wayne County's Department of Environment, told county residents Thursday that all the soil contaminated with polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) will be taken to a landfill in Salem Township. Murray discussed the excavation at a meeting on the lake's \$10 million restoration project.

Tests have indicated the soil falls under the 50 parts per million standard of PCBs, which allows it to be transported to state landfills. If the levels exceeded that figure, the soil would have to be transported to outstate landfills.

"The amount of PCB is low enough," Murray said. "(The PCBs) don't need special treatment."

Project highlights

Murray also highlighted several other

aspects of the project:

- Contractors may begin lowering the lake as early as Thursday. Excavation will continue throughout the late summer into September.

- Hines Drive will be closed for about 18 months during the restoration from I-275 to Jughandle Road, or roughly Haggerty to Newburgh Road. It is expected to be closed from early April until the project is completed in July 1998.

That portion of Hines will be restored in 1998.

- The first of two fish kills is scheduled for May. Rotenone, a pesticide derived from plant roots that kills fish and can be fatal to tadpoles and frogs, will be sprayed on the water in a monitored environment, while potassium permanganate will be used to detoxify the rotenone.

The eradication is expected to remove fish contaminated with PCBs, while a second kill is scheduled in June 1998, before the lake is restocked with fish.

The state's advisory against consuming fish from the Rouge River will continue.

Contractual work

Murray summarized the major contractors involved in the project:

- Browning Ferris Industries (BFI) was recently awarded a \$1.6 million disposal contract for the excavated soil, but some items still are being negotiated in the contract, Murray said.

- John Carlo Inc. of Shelby Township received a \$7.4 million contract for the actual excavation and restoration. That firm is expected to begin excavation in April and complete it by May 15, 1998.

A toll-free number is expected to be made available soon for residents to call if they have questions.

Jim Ridgway, president of Environmental Consulting & Technology, told the audience plants will be included in

the restoration and fish will be restocked once the second fish eradication is finished.

"Most fish will die and float," Ridgway said. Monitors will check the rotenone levels.

The source of the PCBs was the former site of Evans Product in Livonia. The Environmental Protection Agency, Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and Wayne County's Department of Environment are involved with the cleanup of that site.

Most of the PCBs in Newburgh Lake are in a 10- to 20-inch depth level, covered with sediment.

Besides the closing of a portion of Hines Drive, residents can expect construction noise, odor from the excavation of muck, plant life and sediments, and prevented use of the lake for 18 months.

Residential concerns

County Commissioner Kay Beard, D-Westland, asked Murray if there were

similar plans to remediate Nankin Lake. Murray said there were no funds currently available for such a project.

A resident asked if PCB-contaminated fish downstream could return to the lake after the remediation. Murray said fish cannot get past the dam.

He added that combined sewer overflows (outflows from sanitary sewers and storm water drains that enter the river) will be separated next year in Livonia, Plymouth Township, Westland and Garden City to help maintain the remediation.

"We do not want to have material that will recontaminate the site," Murray said.

Murray wants to educate the public on the effects of phosphorous and fertilizers on the river. "It would be a shame to spend \$10 million (on Newburgh Lake), just to have it weeded up downstream," Murray said.

Excavation workers will not need "moonsuits" protecting them from exposure from the PCBs because the levels are so low, Murray said.

GOP, Dems vary in views of state's problems

State Senate Republicans and Democrats not only offer different solutions to problems. They have far different notions of what Michigan's problems are.

A few days after Gov. John Engler's State of the State address, party leaders unveiled their own agendas for the two-year legislative term. Sample issues:

- "Civil service reform."

Republicans, led by majority leader Dick Posthumus of Alto, see it as necessary but don't define "reform." In the past, Posthumus has said too many top layers of state departments are protected by civil service.

Democrats don't list it as an issue.

- Consumer protection.

Senate minority leader John

Cherry of Clio has a seven-point program that includes refusal to hide company settlements of product liability lawsuits, "strengthening the ban on fully automated telephone sale solicitations," limiting "junk mail and phone calling," and creating a standardized form for auto insurance policies. House Democrats have formed a consumer affairs committee.

The GOP agenda has no consumer item.

- Transportation spending. Republicans propose to "reform" it but don't say how. Republicans also propose to "invest more in transportation infrastructure."

Democrats don't list it transportation as a problem. They refuse to put forth a fuel tax increase proposal until Republicans, including Engler, offer some support for it.

- Environment. Democrats

want to "toughen the environmental audit law to revoke immunity if an uncovered violation is one that is already required to be reported to a state or federal agency. Violations uncovered in voluntary audits are currently immune from prosecution."

The second sentence refers to the GOP-backed law sponsored in 1995 by Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton.

Democrats propose a business tax credit for pollution prevention initiatives "above what is required," a biological monitoring program for air and water quality, better reporting on the effects of pollution, and an annual public health advisory on contaminated fish.

The Republican agenda

addresses none of the Democrats' issues. It proposes to "restrict and regulate waste, acquire developmental rights for protection of sensitive areas, comprehensive protection of water resources and sound scientific management of wildlife."

- Core curriculum. This was a Republican "hot button" in the early 1990s, but the party turned against it when it rewrote the school code in 1995-6.

Democrats propose to restore the mandatory core curriculum to assure "that the basics are being taught." Another Democratic pet is to reduce class sizes in grades 1-3, pointing to the success in Flint.

Republicans propose to "increase school accountability."

BRUSHING UP

Dentists advise their patients to replace their toothbrushes at least every three to four months to ensure their efficient cleansing action. Toothbrushes should be replaced even sooner when illness strikes, because a brush can harbor bacteria that may be reintroduced into the mouth to prolong sickness. What type of toothbrush should patients reach for when the bristles on their older brushes become frayed? Patients with impaired manual dexterity may best be served by electric toothbrushes. As for traditional manual toothbrushes with their many head shapes and handle-angle options, the Academy of General Dentistry says that one type of toothbrush does not necessarily do a better job of removing plaque than another. What matters most is that people use their toothbrushes, preferably for up to three minutes per brushing session.

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P.S. Ideally, a toothbrush should have soft, rounded bristles. Medium to hard bristles may be tough on the gums.

Susan Roush McClenaghan grew up surrounded by racing cars, so it's no wonder her one-person show of graphic and fine art at the Livonia City Hall spotlights Thunderbird Supercoups and winged horses.

Presented by the Livonia Arts Commission, the exhibition, which features a variety of media from computer illustrated vehicle graphics to fantasy oil paintings of dragons and knights, is well worth a look, even if art isn't your first love.

As far back as high school, Roush McClenaghan knew her career would have to include both art and cars. As the daughter of Roush Industries' founder Jack Roush, it was inevitable. The Livonia-based conglomerate, with 32 facilities in the United States, Europe and Mexico, specializes in research and development for the automotive industry.

Interest in cars

"I've been exposed to cars all my life. After high school I started taking an interest in cars," said Roush McClenaghan, who graduated from Madonna University with a bachelor's degree in graphic design.

An interest is hardly descriptive of her involvement with Roush Racing's thundering Ford cars. Roush McClenaghan recently built the engine for her dream car, a 1968

Mercury Cougar which is featured in the February issue of Super Ford magazine. Of course, she had a little help with the engine from the Roush mechanics who build the Winston Cup Series engines.

"There's a definite connection between my art and cars

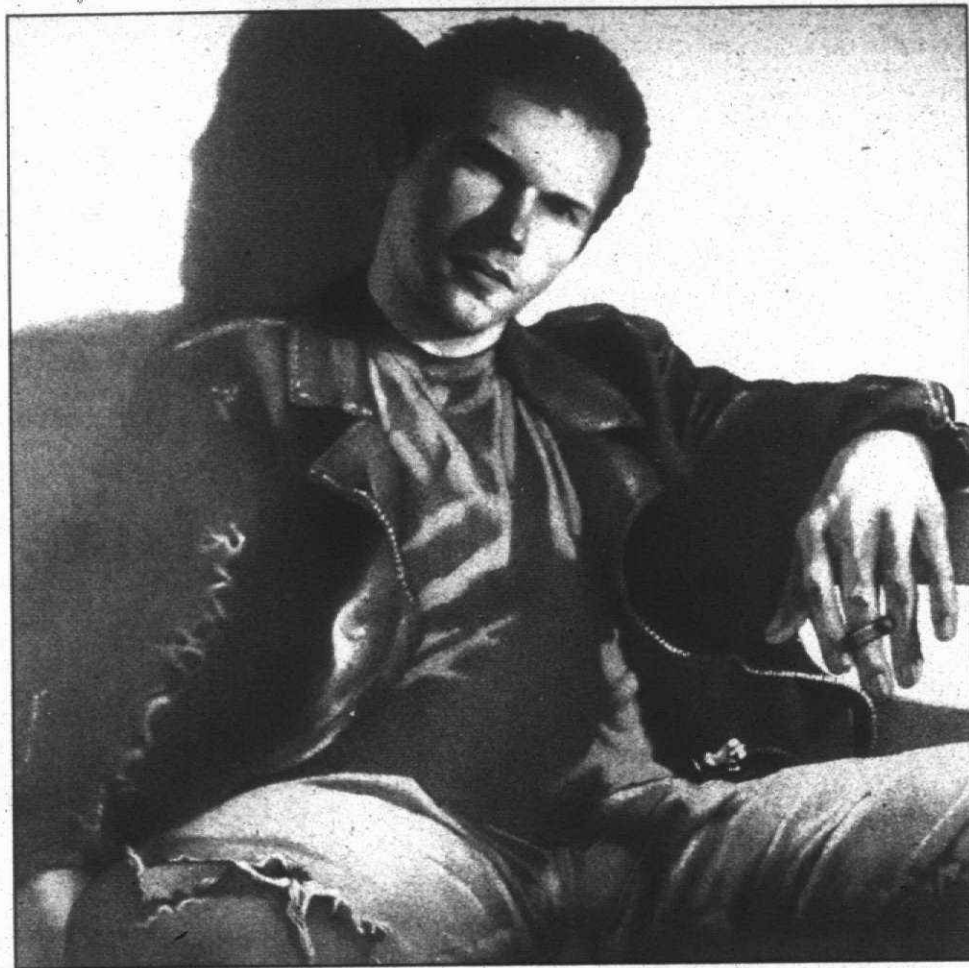
because both require a sensitivity to detail. You have to be skilled with your hands. I've heard that people who are artistically inclined are mechanically inclined as well," said the Livonia artist who until recently worked as a free-lance graphic designer on projects developing vehicle graphics for racing cars.

"I love the variety, but my priorities are to use my lifetime to develop my skills to be the best I can be whether it's drawing a car or a dragon."

Roush McClenaghan's art and cars seem entwined in more ways than obvious at first glance. As curator for the Roush Racing Museum, she is influenced by the Ford cars owned by the museum. Once considered a material for commercial art or illustration, colored pencil is well on its way to earning respect as a fine art. As a measure of the medium's success, the Birmingham Bloomfield Art Association will host a regional exhibit sponsored by the Colored Pencil Society of America's southeast Michigan chapter Feb. 22 to March 15.

The Midwest Color '97 Exhibition features works by 47 artists from Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa. From 246 entries, juror Bernard Aime Poulin chose 59 pieces in a variety of styles ranging from translucent portraiture, landscape, floral and still life to opaque abstract. Internationally known for his colored pencil portraits of children, corporate executives, political figures and royalty, Poulin studied art in Florence, Italy. The Ottawa artist's latest book on techniques, "The Complete Colored Pencil Book," was published by North Light Press.

This is the second time the BBAA will exhibit a CPSA show. In 1993, the national show won rave reviews from BBAA members.

"It's an art form that's up and coming and really quite beautiful. It's quite amazing what they can do," said BBAA executive director Janet Torno.

Tecumseh artist Bonnie Auten began working in colored pencil seven years ago. As president of the CPSA regional chapter founded in 1992, she's watched the medium grow in a variety of ways along with the organization established to promote the stature and awareness of colored pencil as a fine art form in the professional art world as well as by the general public. The CPSA provides a forum for education, communication and recognition of colored pencil artists. It will hold its fifth International Exhibition/Convention in August in Chicago.

"A nonprofit organization, the CPSA was formed to break down the barriers to accept col-

ored pencil as a viable medium. It's a very versatile medium so more fine artists are using them. Manufacturers have taken note of the increasing numbers. As a result, pencils have gotten better. They're light fast and color fast now," said Bonnie Auten, who was accepted into the show for a work from her "Series of Hands."

Still, artists like Sherry Eid of Livonia feel as if they work in a vacuum, isolated from the rest of the art world. A colored pencil instructor at Schoolcraft College in Livonia, Eid primarily does portraiture similar to "The Watcher," juried into the Midwest exhibition at the BBAA.

"I originally joined the national group to learn about the materials and light fastness rating. It's an important consideration now that colored pencil is being used more for fine art than illustration," said Eid.

From traditional to abstract, colored pencil is capable of portraying a range of moods as well. Marilyn Gorman of Birmingham creates her pensive portraits of young people in colored pencil. In "Rebel Without a Pause" she softens the hard edges of her 20-year old son Ian. Gorman emphasizes the eyes, looking past torn blue jeans to find a diamond in the rough.

"I can get effects with colored pencil that I can't get with other mediums. When you're working with colored pencil you're working with a pen point. When you're working with a brush, you're laying down a stroke that's an inch wide," said Marilyn Gorman.

Billie Thompson takes the exacting medium of colored pencil to new heights with a richly colored abstract which began as a still life featuring a bowl of oranges. Mixing blues and oranges, Thompson builds up color in layers to produce depth.

A watercolorist for many years, the Livonia resident selected colored pencil as her medium of choice one year ago because it offered the opportunity to explore its versatility.

"I was looking for something different. I can mix media with colored pencil and it's very

portable. For an artist, transportation with ease is important," said Billie Thompson, a board member of the Livonia Arts Commission.

Livonia artist Nancy Hurd agrees with Thompson. An enthusiastic supporter of the medium she's worked in for 10 years, Hurd exhibits two portraits in the CPSA exhibit.

"It's easy to pick up and lay down, and amazing what a variety you can get," said Nancy Hurd.

Other local artists in the Midwest exhibition include Davya Cohen of West Bloomfield; Jeanne Tennent, Birmingham; Neil Swaab, Orchard Lake, and Rita Mach Skoczen, Rochester Hills. Skoczen's work is also exhibited in the Michigan Water Color Society's 50th anniversary show at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

'Tap Dogs' have industrial rhythm

Kids called Darren Disney "Donald Duck" when he was a kid growing up in Newcastle, Australia. Now he, and his childhood chum, choreographer Dein Perry, who created the new Australian musical "Tap Dogs" are having the last laugh.

This Stomp-like show, on its first U.S. tour of 17 cities, has become a sensation. In Denver crowds of 3,000 showed up every night to see the hour-and-a-half blue-collar work boots tapping their way across steel girders and drum pads on a set that

looks like an industrial site.

The show opens Feb. 18 at Detroit Opera House, the last stop junction before it hits Off-Broadway's Union Square Theatre.

"The mixture of people in our audiences is incredible," said Disney. "The other night I looked out at the audience and I saw a priest, a drag queen, and a grandmother with her grandchildren all sitting in the front row."

Choreographer Dein Perry and Disney began dancing together when they were six at a local Aussie dance studio.

"That is what young boys did in Newcastle if you didn't play sports,"

said Disney.

At 18, Disney went on to appear in shows in Melbourne and Sydney, Australia. Perry became a boilermaker machinist at the Newcastle BHP steel mill. In those three years, Perry found the inspiration for a show to recapture interest in tap dancing, which Disney says was killed by Elvis and rock-n-roll.

While choreographing "Hot Shoe Shuffle" in London, Perry got a call from the Sydney Theatre Company to develop a new show with a small government grant. "Tap Dogs" was creat-

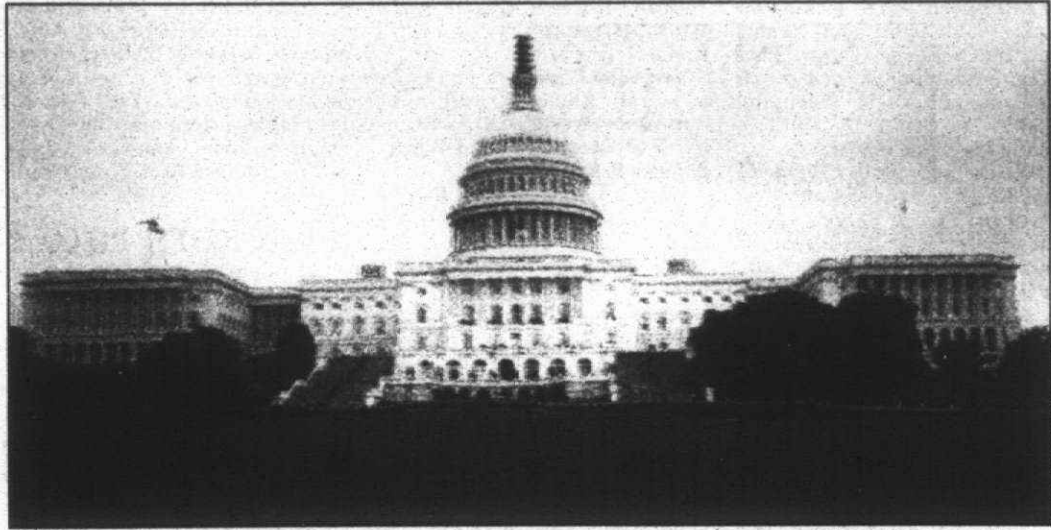

to get comfortable with the city. You can get on and off as many times as you want during the day. Riding the Tourmobile is cheaper than taking cabs and a great way to get to historic sites. Some of our tour guides were boring, and others, like Elliott, were a joy. He had a great sense of humor and, besides telling us all the textbook stuff, shared great insider information, such as the National Gallery of Arts is home to great masters, chefs who work at two restaurants on the concourse level of the National Gallery, and the Capitol cafeteria is a great place for lunch, or to catch a glimpse of a well-known politician.

In addition to the Tourmobile, there are Trolley Tours. The Trolley's a little more expensive, the fare is \$18 adults, \$9 children ages 4-12, but they stop at the FBI Building-Ford's Theatre, Freedom Plaza-National Aquarium and Washington National Cathedral, which aren't Tourmobile stops. The Trolley also offers an evening tour of the Jef-

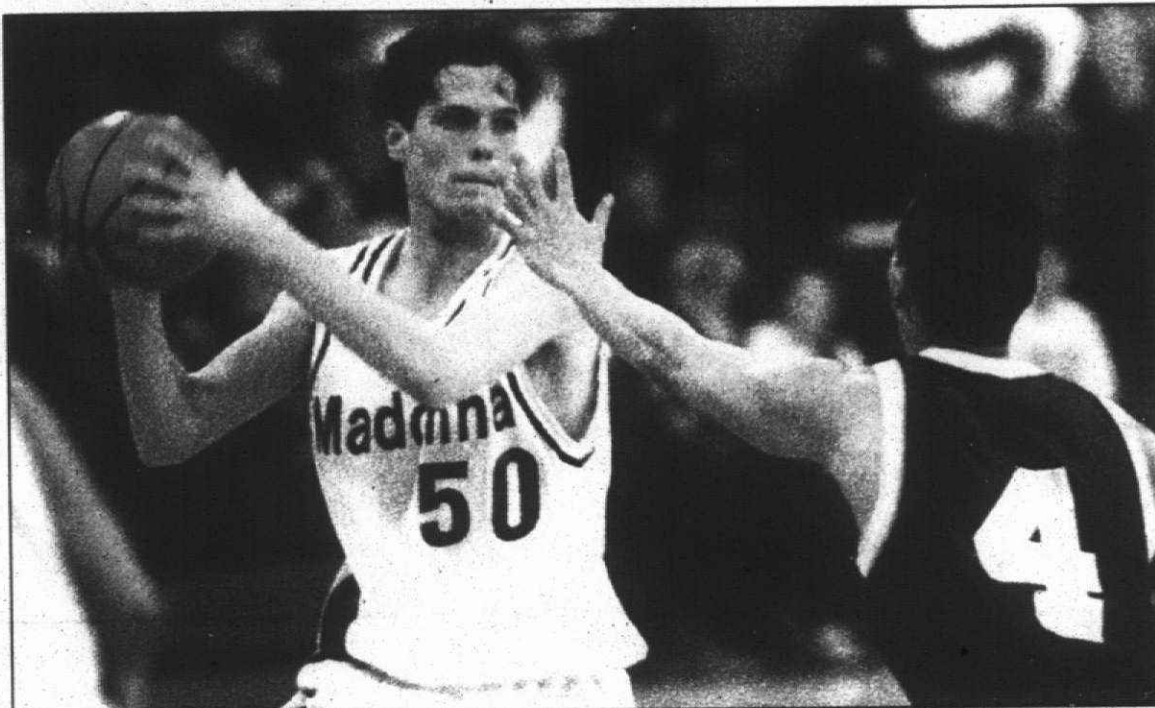

"We didn't wrestle our best, and therefore we didn't win," was about as much as Salem coach Ron Krueger cared to say about the district results.

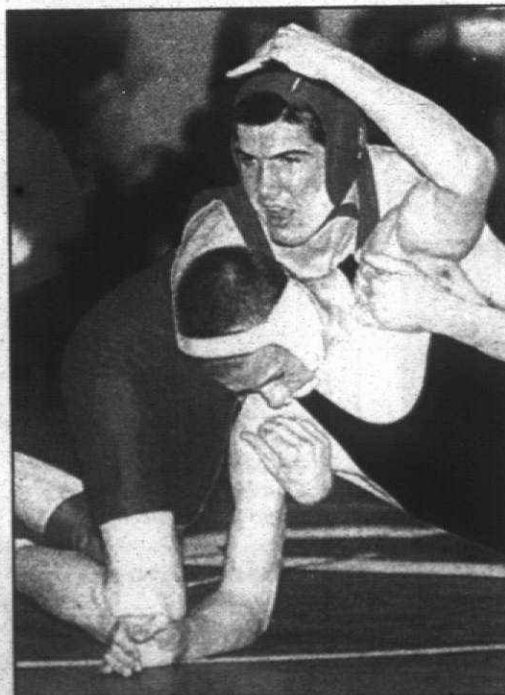
But the Rocks were certainly capable of beating Wayne. Through 155 pounds, Salem had five weight class wins to the Zebras' four.

One very basic — but important — barometer used by coaches to test a team's mettle is the reaction after an upsetting loss.

In other words, how well they bounce back.

Plymouth Salem passed that test in its final regular-season, and Western Lakes Activities Association, game of the season Friday when the Rocks knocked off visiting Farmington 58-35.

NATURE NOTES

Valentine's Day is not only the holiday of love for people, it is also the time of year when the red squirrel becomes amorous. Red squirrels are often identified by people as those cute baby squirrels. They are smaller than the fox squirrel that most people see at their backyard bird feeder, but they are not a baby squirrel.

Just the other day I watched two red squirrels, one immediately following the other, as they raced around the yard. This is basically squirrel courtship.

During most of the winter, females and males defend exclusive territories. But beginning in February, males begin to invade a female's territory to investigate her interest in mating.

Females spend a lot of time chasing males from their territory until they eventually become interested in the male. During these chases they are often oblivious to their surroundings and are vulnerable to predation.

Earlier in the year, or even late last year, fox squirrels showed the same kind of behavior. Two fox squirrels race up or down a tree, one behind the other, in a pattern like that of a stripe on a spinning barber's pole. This activity comes to an end after mating.

Then the female searches for a suitable tree hollow in which to raise her young.

Both the red and fox squirrel will give birth to their young about the same time of the year. Mid-March is about the time of the year when little pink hairless squirrels are born with their eyes and ears closed. By June, the adults are free of their young and soon begin chasing each other again in order to raise another litter of young for the year.

Not only did my thoughts turn to red squirrels when I saw them chasing each other in my backyard, but I also thought of them when I passed a tree with a long icicle developing from an opening in a branch.

Sap has begun to flow in some trees and as it seeped from this opening an icicle about 14 inches long had developed.

Red squirrels have been observed intentionally searing a branch to cause sap to flow out. They typically do this on maple trees in several places.

When the sap flows out and evaporation occurs, the sugars in the sap become concentrated around the opening. Individual red squirrels will return to their little sap line and lick the concentrated sugar from the little taps they made in the tree.

Since red squirrel courtship seems to coincide with our Valentine's Day, maybe someday some will see a red squirrel bring a sweet icicle of tree sap to their potential mate, like people give their loved ones candy.

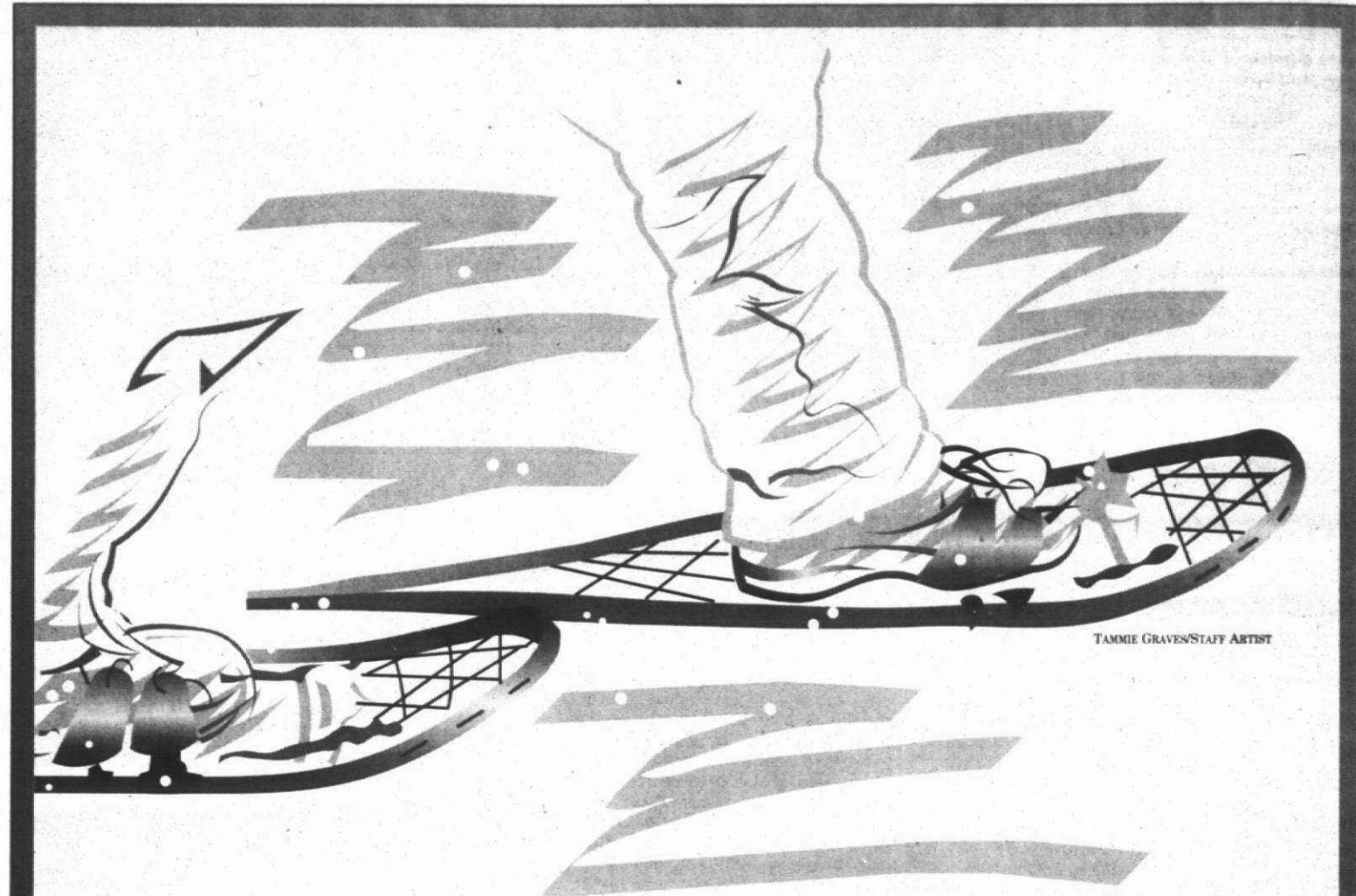

SNOWSHOEING

A walk in the wilderness of your neighborhood park

all it urban snowshoeing. When the snow starts piling up, many folks get the fireplace going and hunker down in front of the television set for the evening.

But for those of us with snowshoes, snow is an invitation to take a silent night walk in a nearby park.

Unlike cross country skis, snowshoes can be kept in a car during winter, ready for a quick jaunt.

Also, you don't need a trail. On a recent winter Sunday morning, I plunged into the woods near Newburgh Lake.

Cross country skiers were taking advantage of the fresh snow, making new tracks along the trail.

But on snowshoes, I was quickly off the trail and in the dense woods near the water.

You could occasionally hear traffic, and there was a parade of cross country skiers on the trail. Apart from that, I could have been in a remote area of northern Michigan. And I was less than five minutes from home.

Snowshoes are easy to master. It's just a walk, a way to get around in the winter, just as the Native Americans who developed them intended.

Climbing uphill on snowshoes is much easier than on cross country skis.

Some use poles while snowshoeing. They can speed you up. But intent is important. And mine is to just have a good winter walk, with no need to cover a lot of ground.

And apparently I'm not the only one moving from cross country skiing to snowshoeing.

"There's been a dramatic increase in snowshoeing," said Chuck Spriggs, manager of the Benchmark in Farmington.

He said the store has been selling snowshoes for 25 years, but that in the last five years sales have grown.

"People want to get out and walk during the winter," said Spriggs, who himself snowshoes.

"Cross country skiing is getting more and more into speed and racing. Some people are trying to get away from that," he said. "For cross country skiing, you need a track. For snowshoeing you don't."

"You can get back into the brush along creeks where the animals and birds are in the winter," he said.

And that's a good place to be.

The cost Snowshoes cost anywhere from \$90 to \$260 and range from the traditional wood and rawhide mesh to lightweight, high-tech metal and plastic shoes for racing and climbing.

"An average casual snowshoe for recreational use costs between \$120 and \$200," said Chuck Spriggs, manager at the Benchmark in Farmington.

To try snowshoeing for a weekend, the Benchmark rents them for \$25. For information, call (810) 477-8116.

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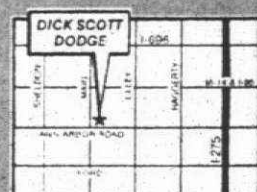

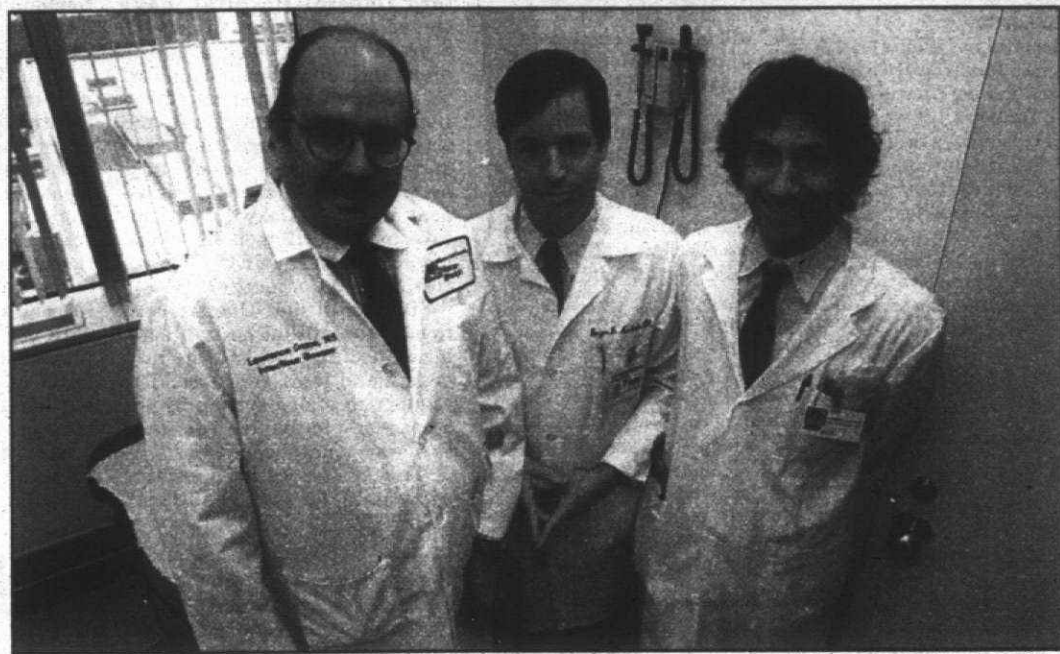

AIDS researchers offer patients hope

Treating AIDS patients isn't the most uplifting of tasks for doctors. Even so, Dr. Lawrence Crane, M.D., and Dr. Rodger MacArthur, M.D., have reason for encouragement.

Crane, a Livonia resident, is director of The Detroit Medical Center HIV/AIDS Program and a professor in the Division of Infectious Diseases at Wayne State University. MacArthur, a Canton resident, is director of clinical research, WSU/Detroit Medical Center HIV/AIDS Program and an associate professor of medicine at WSU.

Crane said the death rate from AIDS among DMC patients has decreased by half recently and there have been fewer AIDS-related hospitalizations. Some patients are even returning to work.

"Patients are doing much better clinically. They're feeling better," MacArthur said. "We're seeing some dramatic turnarounds."

New drugs, specifically protease inhibitors, are working wonders, although not all patients respond and not all can handle the side effects. Crane knows that AIDS remains a serious public health threat.

"It's still an epidemic and I think one of the biggest dangers is complacency. People think the epidemic is over or it's plateauing."

Both Crane and MacArthur are particularly concerned about young people. Those most in need of education are ages 15-25 and having sex for the first time, Crane said.

"The public has to understand it is important to teach about abstinence as well as prevention and safer sex," said Crane, who graduated from the medical school at WSU.

Adolescents are at risk of getting AIDS from heterosexual intercourse, said MacArthur, who graduated from the medical school at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

"We've had a major public health impact," said MacArthur. The number of babies infected in utero is decreasing, but the need

for public education continues.

Data show that needle exchange programs have made a significant impact, Crane said, and data from the gay population also show promising results.

Local treatment

The physicians, nurses and others at The Detroit Medical Center treat nearly 1,000 HIV-infected patients. Such patients who live in the Detroit area generally are treated at either the Detroit Medical Center or at the Henry Ford group, Crane said.

About 20 percent of DMC patients are in clinical studies. The facility receives Ryan White funding through an act of Congress to support those with HIV.

Worldwide, an estimated 30 million people are HIV-positive. In the U.S., that figure varies from a half million to a million, with three-quarters of a million often used.

The biggest advance has occurred in understanding how the virus affects the body, Crane said. "It's that understanding which has led to better treatment."

A person who is HIV-positive may be well from a medical standpoint, but "virological mayhem" is going on, Crane said. There's a sort of a war of destruction of immunity, and mutations in the virus occur quickly.

Only about one-third of those in the Detroit area with HIV know they're infected. "Anything we can do to get people to be tested is a good thing," said Crane, who's not opposed to initial use of home test kits. Testing needs to be discreet and have appropriate safeguards for individual rights.

"If you're negative, that doesn't mean you can go out and have unsafe sex," said Crane, 54.

There's no known drug which will shut off the growth of the virus completely. "You really need

treatments which will impact the turnover by thousands, or hundreds of thousands," Crane said.

Protease inhibitors work in the later stage of the virus. "The way I explain it to my patients is we now can get the virus coming and going," he said. "This really has translated into improved survival."

Protease inhibitors are combined with other drugs, said MacArthur, with some patients taking as many as four or five drugs, including two protease inhibitors. Protease inhibitors act on the virus to block reproduction of viruses.

"They're being used earlier and earlier," the protease inhibitors work at a later point in the virus's life cycle, MacArthur said. Sophisticated tests are used to determine HIV still present in the body.

AZT still used

The viral load can be decreased by a hundredfold or even thousandfold, MacArthur said. AZT, the first major drug developed to treat AIDS patients, remains in use.

"AZT by itself is not particularly potent," said MacArthur, 41. "In combination, it's still a good drug."

Research is being done at Wayne State on a vaccine which would boost the body's immune system against AIDS, but results have been disappointing, MacArthur said. He doesn't believe that research funds for AIDS take away from work on cancer, heart disease and other major killers.

"I think that we need to have more funding for all diseases that affect us to a great extent." The number of years of potential life a person loses should be considered, MacArthur said; AIDS claims people at their most productive years.

He and his colleagues would be delighted to be put out of business by a vaccine.

"Absolutely," he said with a smile. "I would love that. That would be great."

AIDS TIME LINE

1981 - The first cases of a mysterious immune system disorder are documented in the U.S. The Centers for Disease Control cites the cases of five homosexual men in Los Angeles with Pneumocystis carinii, a rare form of pneumonia. The disease is later found to be one of many opportunistic infections that occur in people with AIDS. Most of the early reported cases in the U.S. occur in gay men.

1982 - The CDC names the new disease AIDS - Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

1984 - Scientists in France and the U.S. announce simultaneously that they have isolated the virus that causes AIDS, later named the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV). The first documented case of AIDS is reported in Thailand, which will later suffer one of the highest HIV infection rates in the world.

1985 - The first blood test to detect the presence of antibodies to HIV is approved for use in the U.S. To prevent the further spread of AIDS through transfusions of tainted blood, U.S. blood banks introduce blood-screening tests.

1987 - AZT (zidovudine), marketed under the brand name Retrovir by Burroughs Wellcome, is the first drug to receive Food and Drug Administration approval for treatment of AIDS. Like the other early anti-HIV drugs, AZT is a nucleoside analog that inhibits the action of reverse transcriptase, a viral enzyme that enables the AIDS virus to replicate within human immune system cells.

1988 - The Office for AIDS Research is established to coordinate AIDS research funded through the National Institutes of Health. In August, the number of AIDS cases in the U.S. reaches 100,000.

1989 - Aerosolized pentamidine, one of the most potent drugs to combat opportunistic infections in AIDS patients, is approved for the prevention of Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia. The FDA also approves ganciclovir for treating cytomegalovirus retinitis, an eye infection common in AIDS patients.

1991 - A second reverse transcriptase inhibitor, ddI, is approved and marketed by Bristol-Myers Squibb as Videx. Foscarnet also received FDA approval for treating AIDS-related retinitis. The Ryan White CARE Act provides federal support to cities with high incidences of AIDS for treatment of patients with the disease. In November, the number of AIDS cases in the U.S. reaches 200,000, having doubled in just over two years.

1992 - FDA Administrator David A. Kessler introduced a program of "accelerated approval," giving AIDS patients access to experimental drugs before the approval process is completed. The FDA also approves a third anti-AIDS drug, ddC, sold as Hivid by Hoffman-La Roche.

1994 - An NIH committee decides that a genetically engineered AIDS preventive vaccine, known as gp120 after the viral protein it targets, is not promising enough to warrant large-scale testing in the U.S. The same year a fourth nucleoside analog, ddT (stavudine), is approved for treating AIDS. It is sold under the trade name Zerit by Bristol-Myers Squibb. The number of AIDS cases in the U.S. doubles again, surpassing 400,000.

1995 - The CDC reports that AIDS has become the leading cause of death among all Americans ages 25-44. The agency also reports that the rate of increase in new cases has fallen to 3 percent a year, down from 200 percent a year in the early 1980s. The FDA announces that it will begin accepting applications for HIV home-testing kits, which are commercially available in 1997.

Resources exist to help those with HIV, AIDS

For persons with AIDS, the AIDS Consortium of Southeastern Michigan can help manage the illness.

Each case is managed by one of 13 staff people at the nonprofit agency located in Detroit.

"We can help with everything from counseling to independent living," said Deborah Stevens, financial and administrative director for the agency.

"We even have outreach workers for western Wayne County,"

she said.

She said they go to places where AIDS can be contracted and talk to people, trying to make sure people don't contract the disease.

They also do educational work, she said.

Basically, the agency helps the AIDS patient manage the case.

"This sometimes involves medical treatment, and other times it's just a monthly telephone call to check on the person."

She said that about 80 percent of AIDS patients with which the agency deals are unemployed.

The agency can also help with housing needs for AIDS patients and can help arrange for the delivery of services at home such as meals, she said.

The agency has a toll-free number which to call. It's 1-800-826-1662. Also, the agency's regular telephone number is (313) 496-0140.

She said that either number can be called to make an appointment.

The agency maintains a list of other agencies that provide support for AIDS patients.

Health providers reach pact

DeHart's favorite thing about her new Catera is the sport mode button on the gear shift.

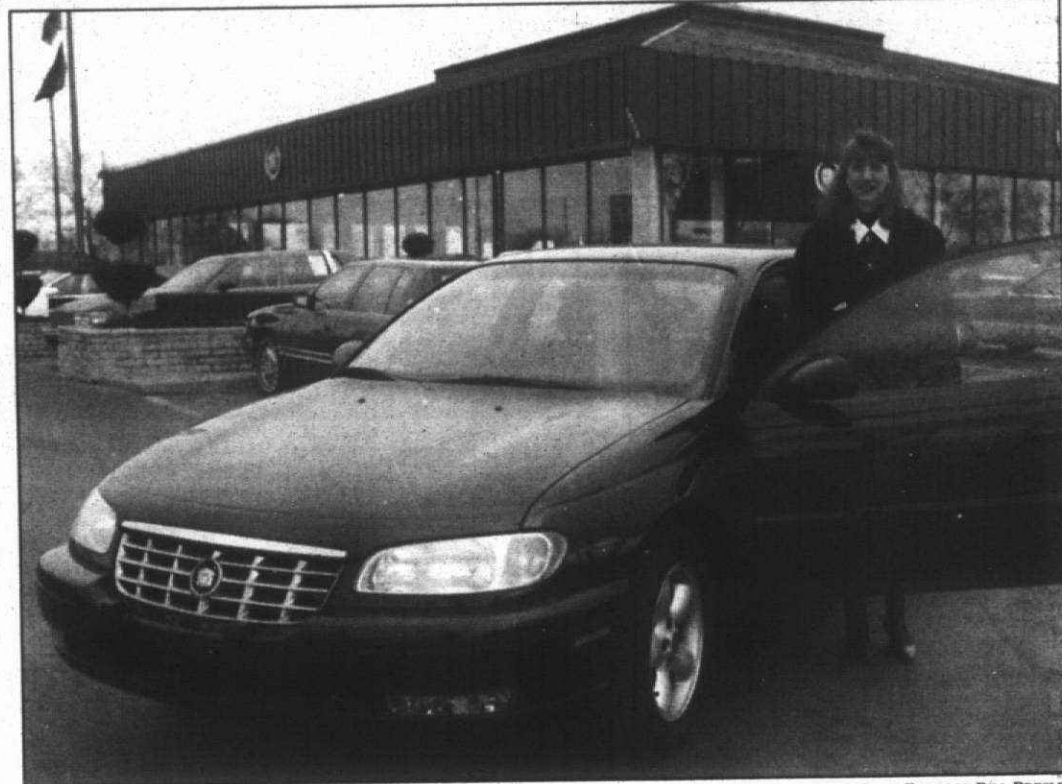
"You push the button and you can actually feel the tighter control of the steering wheel." She also appreciates the heated seats.

Small world

Priest living in Japan reaches out through the Internet

I continue to be amazed about how the Internet makes the world within reach so easily.

On Christmas Day, I received an E-mail message offering Christmas greetings from a Catholic priest in Japan. The Rev. Denis McGowan has an Internet connection and one day was doing searches on the word "Livonia" because his sister lives here.

McGowan came upon O&E Online and spent some time reading stories about Livonia on our electronic news edition. He came across the Internet column I had written that week on Hanukkah. There was some information in that column that McGowan found interesting enough to include in a subsequent sermon.

So, on Christmas Day, he sent E-mail holiday greetings and included a word of appreciation for the sermon help. I returned

the greetings and inquired about his ministry in Japan. A few days ago, he communicated with me about a computer virus report he had received after reading my column on "Spam" that mentioned the "Good Time" virus hoax.

"I was surprised when I read your column about 'Spam' that 'Good Time' was a hoax since I was warned last August by a friend here in Japan about it, then in October received a detailed 'report' from somebody in the U.S. about how 'vicious' it was. So, apparently the stories, thanks to the Internet, get spread rapidly and all over the world."

He shared with me the URL of a Web site where computer users can get up-to-date information on hoaxes before forwarding virus reports to someone else. When McGowan visited the Virus Myths Page at <http://www.kumite.com/virus/>, he found this direct quote about the Deeyenda Good Times virus report: "A hoax apparently surfaced in November 1996 warning users not to read E-mail if it contains the word 'Deeyenda' in the subject line. This new hoax uses many tactics found in other hoaxes, myths, and urban legends."

The priest used this latest information to answer my earlier queries. I learned that McGowan is living in the city of Ikeda, a suburb of Osaka. He has been in Japan since 1957, and most of his work has been in a parish. He is a member of the Passionist Order and informed me that there is a Passionist monastery and retreat house on Schoolcraft.

A couple days after hearing from McGowan, I received another interesting E-mail from Wendy Shepherd of Commerce Township who is a regular reader of West Bloomfield/Lakes edition of the Eccentric.

Shepherd and Michele Strasz have teamed up to produce JumpStart Michigan at <http://www.jumpstartmich.com>. JumpStart Michigan is a monthly interactive magazine for people interested in making a difference in the lives of children in Michigan.

The E-zine is a nonpartisan publication by Catalyst for Action which for seven years has been advocating for children on a grassroots level.

McGowan read the story about a Web site that furnishes users with the address and a map to the house of individuals. "I've done the same looking up my sister, relatives and friends,

click their way through the pages and to be able to link directly with Web sites and E-mails of organizations and campaigns that interest them.

To be "come as you are" advocacy, with no particular bias or bent... just a resource to help people become involved in the process of helping the lives of children and their families become more healthy and secure. We have successfully moved child advocacy into a more public awareness with events which we have coordinated."

For two years, Shepherd and Strasz were the chair and co-chair of Michigan's Month of the Young Child, bringing media and corporations into partnership with this statewide event. Twice, Catalyst for Action "opened" the stadium to hold Kids Advocacy Day.

Strasz has three times coordinated Michigan's Campaign for Children public awareness event tied to the national and state elections. Shepherd coordinated the Michigan Stand for Children attended by 6,000 people at the stadium last October. Shepherd also has served as coordinator of

the Michigan Worthy Wage Coalition for the past six years and in this role developed the Child Care Job Shadow Day. This activity has included one-day child care teachers' Neon Shine, Stephen Yokich, Drago (the Detroit Neon star), U.S. Rep. Sander Levin, various mayors and other community and elected officials. The event has been replicated in nearly every state in the country in the past two years.

"Michele and I like to take a more proactive and nontraditional approach to advocacy. The feedback we have gotten on our Web site has been great so far."

Although closer to home than McGowan, I also was excited to hear from Wendy Shepherd. Commerce Township is a member of the Eccentric's main Emory Daniels are

Distance no obstacle to Irvine community

Distance no obstacle to Irvine community. People today will drive for housing value.

That's the thinking of the Irvine Group, a Farmington Hills-based building company that has acquired nearly 250 lots at Rolling Oaks in Howell.

"This isn't far any more," said Norman Finkelstein, Irvine vice president. "We're a half hour from the Novi area. That isn't considered far. Look how popular the Brighton area is. We're 10 minutes away."

"Transportation is good," Finkelstein added. "M-59, I-96 and Grand River all come together here. A few miles east is M-23. From here, you can go anywhere quickly."

"This sub is so well located," said Barbara Kotula, sales representative. "Lansing is a half hour away. Ann Arbor is a half hour."

"I'm getting primarily move-up buyers," she said. "For most, it's their first new build. We have some empty nesters. But obviously, when you have a school complex right across from here, you get lots of families."

Five floor plans are available, ranging in price from \$157,500 for a colonial of 1,640 square feet with three bedrooms and 2-1/2 baths to \$195,500 for a 2,380-square-foot colonial with four bedrooms and 2-1/2 baths.

Standard features in all include fireplace, two-car attached garage, basement, range and dishwasher. A first-floor laundry is included at no extra cost in four of the plans.

"We're a little more bread-and-butter here," Kotula said. "They're more conservative, watching dollars. They want to be comfortable but don't want glitz."

Three models have been constructed.

The Barton is a Cape Cod of 1,880 square feet with the mas-

ter suite on the main floor.

The master has a pan ceiling, separate tub and shower and a walk-in closet.

The house also features a library with cathedral ceiling, family room, kitchen/nook, dining area and laundry on the first floor.

Two bedrooms and a full bath are upstairs.

Base price is \$190,500. The model with upgrades is about \$204,300, not including landscaping.

The Manchester, a colonial of 1,640 square feet, is the smallest and most economically priced at \$157,500 base.

The main living area includes a living room, dining room, kitchen/nook and family room with cathedral ceiling.

All three bedrooms are upstairs. The master with cathedral ceiling also has a shower and walk-in closet. A second full bath also is on the second floor.

The first-floor laundry (\$5,400) is an extra in this plan. The Manchester model with upgrades carries a price of about \$166,500.

The Regency Deluxe, a colonial of 2,380 square feet, is the largest and most expensive.

The traditional layout includes library, living room, dining room, family room with two-story ceil-

ing, kitchen/nook with island and laundry.

The master has a pan ceiling, separate tub and shower and walk-in closet. Three other bedrooms and a full bath also are upstairs.

The model with extras prices out at about \$202,000.

Vinyl siding and brick are the primary exterior materials.

"I think one thing they (visitors) like best is we're willing to make changes, discuss things," Kotula said.

The Irvine reputation will draw many prospects into Rolling Oaks, Finkelstein said.

"We're the biggest name in quality building that has come out to this area," he said. "We've been around three generations."

There are other draws, too.

"The area is dotted with lakes and parks," Finkelstein said. "Howell has an aura with a real downtown. It's a very charming area. Kensington Valley, an upscale outlet mall, is two miles away."

"We're a short walk from the hospital (McPherson). You have a nice airport near Howell," he said.

The property tax rate is now \$34.81 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation, half of market value. That means the owners of a \$157,500 house would pay about \$2,750 the first year.

"Obviously, the subdivision location was great with the schools," Leigh said. "The neighborhood is full of kids. I guess we liked the yards. We wanted a two-story. I like that the living room and dining room are two separate rooms."

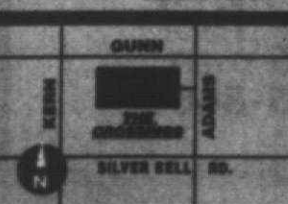
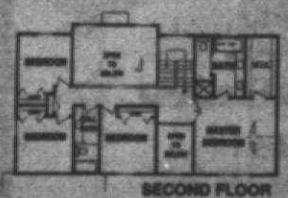
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Know the facts before you buy clothes washer

Looking to buy a laundry pair? Although you probably don't want to spend extra money on a washer or dryer that's more machine than you need, buying something that you'll outgrow in a year or two can be even worse.

To make sure the model you buy is right for you, now and in the future, the home economists at Whirlpool recommend first taking a close look at your real laundry needs. The following questions should help you get started:

How much laundry?

How often you wash or dry clothes, what size bedding you have and how many people are in your family will

go directly to what size machine you should be looking at. Although the definition for such capacity labels as "large" and "super" tend to change from manufacturer to manufacturer, most washers and dryers typically come in the following sizes:

Washers

- 3.0 to 3.2 cu. ft. - Large enough for family-size loads and king-size sheets or blankets.
- 2.6 to 2.8 cu. ft. - Offers average room for a small family with few loads per week.
- 2.45 to 2.5 cu. ft. - Ideal for a single person with twin-size sheets or blankets.

Dryers

- 6.8 to 7.0 cu. ft. - Handles family-size loads and king-size sheets or blankets.
- 6.0 to 6.5 cu. ft. - Offers average room for a small family with few loads per week.
- 5.0 to 5.5 cu. ft. - Ideal for single person with twin-size sheets or blankets.

What kind of clothes?

Looking at the types of clothes you and your family normally wear can go a long way in helping you choose a washer or dryer.

- Mostly denims and uniforms? A one-speed washer motor offers a fast agitation and a fast spin to clean these heavy-duty items. A dryer

with only a high-heat setting would also probably be adequate with these fabrics.

- Are there more knits and sweaters or permanent press pants and blouses in your closets? These fabrics need more moderate care. A two-speed washer is a better choice here because of its slower agitation and spin speeds. Dryers should have a medium or warm setting to best care for these fabrics.
- Delicates, lingerie, silks? These need the extra-gentle care that a dryer with a low-heat or air-only setting and a three-speed washer offer.

Are your closets full of a combination of fabrics? A good rule of thumb is the more cycles or settings on a washer or dryer, the more fabrics they can properly handle.

Do you have any special needs?

- Do you wear glasses or have trouble seeing? Look for easy-to-read consoles and large control knobs.
- Are you a first-time user or will your children be responsible for some of the laundry? Look for models that offer such features as color-coded consoles or programmable controls.

What's your laundry area like?

Space is certainly a factor in buying a washer or dryer. For example, a full-size laundry pair would be just fine for most basement laundry rooms, but might be a tight fit if all you have to work with is a bathroom closet. In that case, the solution might be either one of the space-

saver models or a stackable unit.

Other questions to ask yourself:

- Where is the laundry room located in terms of the rest of the house? If it's close to a family room you might want to consider a model with a sound insulation package and adjustable end-of-cycle signal. If it's far from the main living area, look for audible signals.
- Is the laundry area dimly lit? You might want a laundry pair with easy-to-read and/or lighted consoles. A dryer with an interior drum light might also be helpful.
- Is there enough room to open the dryer door? Dryer doors come in several configurations - side-swing, drop-down and reversible.

Intense demand for Technical Temporaries

Information technology (IT) professionals looking for an alternative to full time jobs might do well to consider contracting. Across the country, firms specializing in contract staffing say there's never been a better time to take the plunge into the temporary IT marketplace.

Sean McGowan, director of marketing for Krystal Solutions, headquartered in Huntington Beach, California, says, "The contract market is growing by leaps and bounds."

Alan Shulman, a division vice president for Comsys Technical Services in Rockville, Md., comments, "There are more positions than there are people to fill them."

Although Shulman says opportunities are wide spread, some technologies are definitely in greater demand than others. According to McGowan, PeopleSoft, SAP and Oracle are hot technologies right now. Pete Kaminsky, senior vice president of The Consortium, a subsidiary of New Jersey-based RCM Technologies, adds, "There's also a huge demand for Unix, C, and C++ people, as well as people with Internet and intranet skills, and Java expertise."

McGowan says, "We're also seeing a strong rise in demand for technical support including PC and LAN technicians and help desk staff."

Even mainframe expertise is back in demand. "Companies aren't getting rid of their legacy systems so fast. And in the last couple of years, a lot of mainframe people got retrained in client server technologies and landed new jobs they don't want to leave," McGowan explains. "That's created a shortage of high end mainframe professionals to meet current needs."

The Year 2000 conversion facing companies with mainframes in another contributing to the demand for mainframe expertise, says Joe Liberatore, regional vice president for Atlanta, Tampa and Orlando, for the Information Technology division of Romac International.

Not surprisingly, high demand is producing wage inflation for the hottest skills. McGowan points to earnings of \$100-\$140 per hour for high level Oracle and PeopleSoft architects able to design

large systems. Liberatore says he sees hourly rates for those with PeopleSoft expertise ranging from \$60-\$150 per hour and Internet expertise commanding \$40-\$150 per hour, depending on skill level and experience.

McGowan points out that many projects require 60, 70 or more hours of work a week, and contractors earn their hourly rate for every hour worked. Liberatore also notes that for the highest level experts in such high-demand areas as Powerbuilder, Oracle, and Lotus Notes, assignments often involve travel and client companies pay travel and lodging expenses in addition to hourly rates.

For those who worry about downtime between projects, Kaminsky says,

"Contractors with in-demand skills can work 52 weeks a year and more than 40 hours a week if they want." They can also frequently choose from more than one contract opportunity at a time.

Beyond earning potential, McGowan says other attractions of contracting include flexibility, variety, and opportunities to travel. "There are projects around the country as well as in Europe and Asia," he says.

What if you don't have experience or training in today's hottest technologies? Ziman says existing technology skills, coupled with a willingness to pick up new technologies, can be a viable starting point for contracting, albeit not at the highest hourly rates. Say Ziman, "This

can be especially true with a former employer," with whose company culture, programs and processes you're familiar.

For those tempted to consider contracting but afraid to leave the security of a full time job, Ziman says, "Look at the worst case scenario. If you didn't like contracting, you can always go back to full time employment, where demand is intense for those with in-demand skills."

McGowan agrees, noting, "If someone maintains marketable skills, they won't have any difficulty finding another full time job or contract opportunity."

Take your time when hiring a Lawyer

Chances are, you wouldn't buy a car without a test-drive. Yet many people hire lawyers to handle workplace disputes with little regard for the professional's qualifications, personal style, or even fees. Some workers wind up regretting the hasty choice.

One who did was Elizabeth Layman, a former computer scientist at the Xerox Corporation. First she bounced from lawyer to lawyer until she found one willing to handle her sex and age discrimination case against the company. Then she shelled out more than \$35,000 in legal fees and expenses while she waged a four-year lawsuit. By the time she won a hefty \$9 million jury verdict in 1990, she and her lawyer had sparred over everything from witnesses to settlement discussions.

Things really deteriorated when a federal district court judge tossed out the verdict, leaving Layman with a stack of bills and a career in ruins. Soon she and her lawyer were in court against each other. He claimed she owed him another \$25,000. She charged him with malpractice, complaining, among other things, that he misrepresented his experience, didn't try hard enough to settle, and allowed an amateur associate to handle key tasks. They reached a confidential settlement in 1993.

In retrospect, says Layman, who switched fields and is now a lawyer in Houston, she should have put more effort into choosing an attorney. Here are some steps she and others recommend:

- Start with referrals. The best ones come from people who've been involved in similar cases, or whose business judgment you trust -- like bankers, other lawyers, or people in your industry. State and local bar associations can direct you to lawyers in your area, but can't vouch for their skills.

- Interview at least two lawyers before you choose one. Your initial conversation can take place by phone, but it's a good idea to meet in person before you agree to work together. To avoid surprises, inquire whether there's a charge for these preliminary talks, advises Kenneth Menendez, an Atlanta lawyer and author of the book, "Taming The Lawyers" (Merritt Publishing, 1996).

During the interview, Menendez suggests you get as much information as

you can about a lawyer's experience handling other similar cases. Some questions to ask: What percentage of your work involves issues like the ones we're discussing? Can you describe some recent cases, including the final results?

Find out whether this lawyer will handle the entire case, or delegate some portions to a more junior attorney or paralegal. Before signing on, ask to meet the other people who will be working on the matter.

Also discuss your own goals and possible legal strategies. Not every dispute must lead to a lawsuit. Of those that do, 90 percent wind up settling. So, it's important to know whether your lawyer is a gladiator or a peacemaker. Many good employment lawyers try to resolve things through letters, phone calls, or in-person negotiations. You can pay the lawyer by the hour (\$150-\$350 is typical) plus expenses (like photocopying) to do what's needed.

End the interview by getting names of past clients. Even an attorney who insists on confidentiality should be able to offer at least a couple of references. You'll want to ask these clients whether the lawyer was honest, listened to what they had to say, promptly returned phone calls and provided weekly or monthly updates about what was happening.

- Negotiate fees. Although many people are hesitant to discuss money with a lawyer, it's important to strike a deal that's good for both of you. Few employment lawyers take cases strictly "on contingency," meaning they just get paid a percentage of anything you win. Far more common are hybrid arrangements in which the client also pays a reduced hourly rate for certain services, or picks up expenses such as court costs and photocopying.

To protect yourself against any surprises, it's best to set a ceiling on the total tab. And no matter how trustworthy (or intimidating) the lawyer seems, get your agreement in writing.

At first glance, it really doesn't stand out. Other than its distinctive Infiniti badge in front, it just looks like another sport utility vehicle.

The gentleman at our local Sunoco station noticed it right away.

"Is that the Infiniti QX4?" he asked, excitedly. I told him it was.

"Oh, man, I've got an Explorer and I would love to have one of those, but I just can't afford it. That's a great-looking sport ute."

It was unfortunate I didn't quiz him more about his own Explorer; whether it was the base XL that sells for just over \$20,000 or if he had the Limited all-wheel-drive 4-door Explorer that costs \$36,000. If it was the Limited, he could afford a QX4.

Base price of the Infiniti QX4 is \$35,550. And this is a luxury sport utility vehicle. I emphasize luxury because that's what Infiniti is all about. Uncompromised luxury.

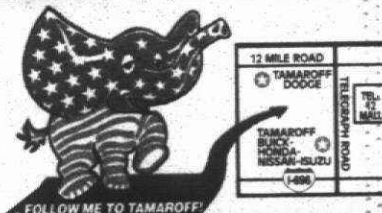

home safely without white knuckles.

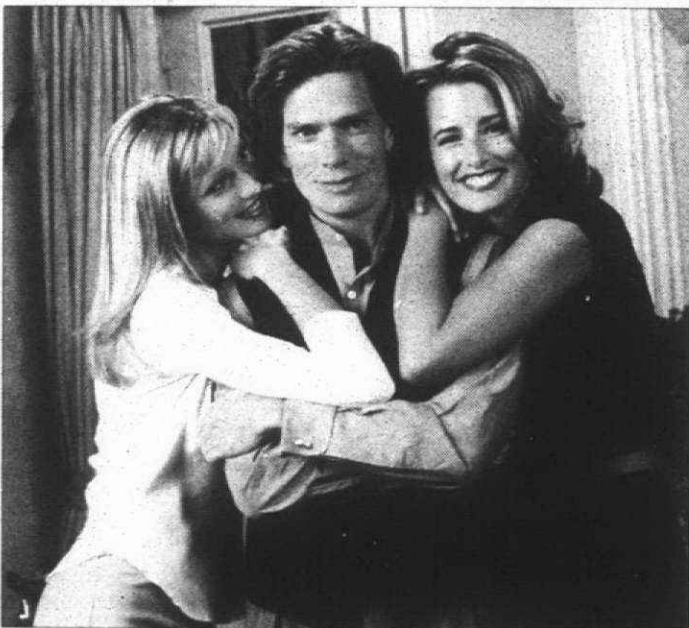

A: Johnson has continued to plug away in a number of movie roles since the 1991 *Flight* movie you mention. Among them are *The Birds II: Land's End*, *Dominion*, *Lone Justice II* and *The Philadelphia Experiment II*. He also was prominently featured in last season's ABC bomb *Courthouse*.

Watch for him in the upcoming TNT movie *Rough Riders*, in which Tom Berenger plays Teddy Roosevelt.

NBC movie *Asteroid* hits close to home for Michael Biehn

Michael Biehn is an old hand at saving the world. The veteran film star battled a cybernetic Arnold Schwarzenegger in *The Terminator* and an army of slimy extraterrestrials in *Aliens*. More recently he fought on the other side of impending disaster, conspiring to level San Francisco in *The Rock*.

Biehn is called into action again for *Asteroid*, a TV movie about meteorites on a fiery crash course with Earth, airing Sunday and Monday, Feb. 16 and 17, on NBC. Biehn plays Jack Wallach, director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, who leaps from helicopters and races raging floodwaters to save lives and stave off global devastation.

"I continue to impress people with my ability to roll around in the dirt with youngsters," Biehn, 40, says.

Inspired by the success of the big-budget disaster films such as *Independence Day* and *Twister*, the \$19 million TV movie is one of the most ambitious special-effects extravaganzas ever made for the small screen. Stargate Films Inc., the visual-effects company responsible for the title sequences of *Twister* and *Eraser*, created almost 265 special-effects scenes for the film.

Asteroid also stars Anabella Sciorra (*Jungle Fever*), Don Franklin (*seaQuest 2032*), Anne-Marie Johnson (*Melrose Place*), Carlos Gomez (*ER*) and Emmy-winner Anthony Zerbe (*Harry O*).

Having made a career of white-knuckle action thrillers, Biehn describes *Asteroid's* production as very similar to the motion pictures in which he's starred.

"The biggest difference is that we have less time to shoot it," he says.

A Hollywood movie will shoot two or three pages of script a day, while small-screen counterparts race through five or six.

"You're basically moving a lot faster, which I myself like," Biehn says. "I get a little bored on the big-budget action movies, because there really is a lot of waiting, especially with special effects, because they just take a long time to set up."

As for *Asteroid's* cataclysmic explosions, death-defying stunts

and rubble-strewn backdrops, Biehn says, "You wouldn't know you were working on a television show if you walked onto the set."

The actor's TV credits include guest appearances on *Hill Street Blues* and *Police Story*, as well as more recent starring roles in made-for-cable movies such as *Strapped*, but it's been 11 years since Biehn worked in network television. He was attracted to *Asteroid* by its "big event" nature.

Fans often recognize Biehn as Kyle Reese from *The Terminator* or as the unbalanced naval officer in *The Abyss*, but rarely do they realize that he's the same actor who also appeared in *Aliens*, *The Rock*, and *Tombstone*.

"It's been hard for people to put all my roles together and know that I've played them all," he explains. "I don't know why, exactly, but I kind of wanted to do a real high-profile piece."

Given *Asteroid's* reported \$2 million promotional campaign, Biehn is about to become a very recognizable face.

The movie's story line involves two large asteroids knocked out of their orbit and into the Earth's gravitational pull by a passing comet. One is on a collision course with Kansas City; the other is massive enough to smack the planet into another Ice Age. As is the case in this type of movie, chaos and destruction ensue, and the large cast of heroic characters is pulled together in the face of catastrophe.

"My feeling about this is that it is going to be pretty much what people expect," Biehn says, acknowledging there's a booming market for such movies, with *Independence Day* and *Twister* the top-grossing films of 1996.

"This, I think, will be an extremely well-done one of those," he says. "I'd be lying if I told you there was something different about this."

"The only thing that I can really say is it's not science fiction. I guess that there's a real possibility that something like this could happen. Our director coined a phrase-it's called 'science faction.'"

Asteroid is just one of several disaster movies heading to theaters and television. *Dante's Peak* and *Volcano* are both set to erupt on the silver screen, while two big-budget asteroid pictures also hope to make

an impact at the box office. Then there's an impending flood picture, as well as *The Titanic* from director James Cameron (*The Terminator*).

"We're going through the different types of special-effects movies, and we're getting the natural disaster movies now," Biehn says. "But one thing I think is nice about our show is we basically had ours in the can while these other ones-as far as the asteroid element goes-are in development."

Usually television follows film's lead rather than the other way around, "so that's kind of nice," he says.

Biehn admits that he shares audiences' morbid fascination with total destruction.

"To me, one of the most exciting things to watch is a real-life tornado ripping the roof off a building," he says.

He's also glued to the screen by the fires that annually devastate portions of California, where he lives with his wife and their 4-year-old son.

"I don't know what it is, but I know when it comes to mass destruction, people are interested in it," Biehn says. "I know that I'll sit and watch that before I'll sit and watch a guy reading poetry."

When he's not too busy saving civilization from asteroids and aliens, that is.

Streep returns to TV for a highly personal role

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It took more than a good script to get Meryl Streep to make another TV movie after 19 years.

Streep won an Emmy for her work in the 1978 drama *Holocaust*, but her services are beyond the reach of most small-screen producers because her acting fee alone is several times the cost of a typical TV movie.

But because of her concern for the subject matter, the actress took a reduced fee to be both star and associate producer of *first do no harm*, airing Sunday, Feb. 16, on ABC. The film takes its title from the Hippocratic oath sworn by physicians.

"We were fueled by a very personal sort of fire on this project," Streep says. "It was not purely an entertainment. It's unapologetically got an agenda. And we thought the best way to get the largest possible audience would be to put it on TV."

The powerful fact-based drama, produced and directed by Jim Abrahams (the *Naked Gun* series), concerns a Midwestern family afflicted by its youngest child's illness. Though the names have been changed, the tragedies of the movie befell an actual family.

Streep plays Lori Reimuler, whose son Robby is diagnosed with epilepsy. Drug treatments fail to stabilize his condition, and the 4-year-old seems destined for life-threatening brain surgery or mental disability.

"I knew Jim (Abrahams) through our kids," Streep explains. "I was pregnant with my youngest about the same time Nancy, his wife, was pregnant with Charlie. When he was about a year old, Charlie began to manifest symptoms of epilepsy."

first do no harm is not Charlie's story. For the fictional Reimulers and thousands of families with sick children, financial and insurance resources are limited. In contrast, the Abrahams family could afford to travel anywhere in search of treatment. But the result for both sets of parents was the same: suffering for their children and despair for themselves.

For both families, hope came through discovery of a diet program in limited use since the 1920s.

"Jim found (an article about) the ketogenic diet in a library," Streep says. "They put Charlie on the diet, and from 90 seizures a day, he had none!"

Most physicians do not advise patients of the diet because it has not been the subject of a clinical study. But in one-third of all cases tried, the high-fat diet controls seizures; in another third, it moderates them. The diet works in more

patients than any other single treatment for juvenile epilepsy. And after several years of use, it constitutes a cure.

Streep and her co-star, Fred Ward, give strong performances as Robby's frantic parents, but the dramatic success of the movie rests with 6-year-old Seth Adkins, whose extraordinary performance as Robby should earn him an Emmy by acclamation.

Other surprises in the cast include a half-dozen nonactors who have benefited from the ketogenic diet in real life. They are identified at the end of the film.

Abrahams hopes the film will give viewers new insight into medical care.

"The fact that you can walk into a doctor's office in 1997 with a critically ill child and be deprived of valuable information, well-documented information that is germane to his well-being," he says, "is an important message for all of us to understand so that we can be advocates for our own health and our children's health."



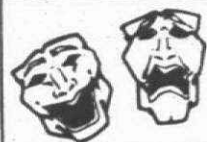

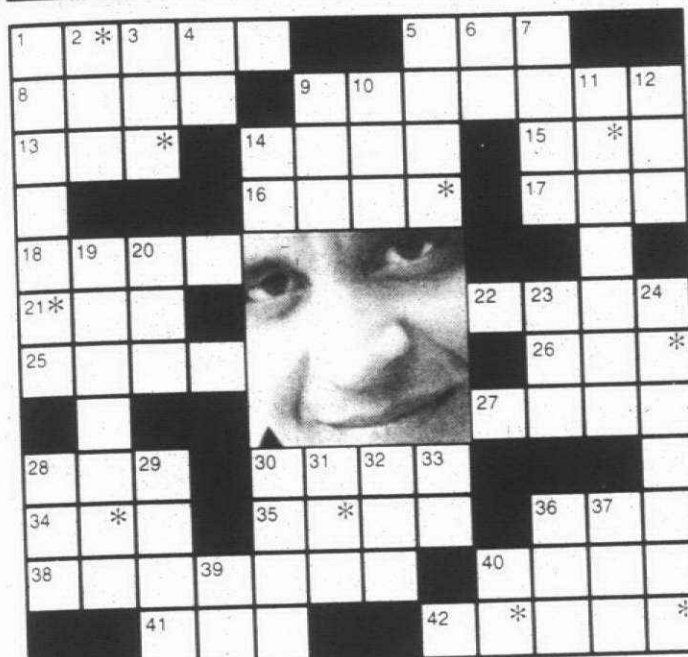
